### **New Tanker For Harcourt**



MINISTER for Emergency Services Jaclyn Symes and Bendigo West Member Maree Edwards visited the Harcourt Fire Brigade last week to announce the 2023-24 Victorian Emergency Service Equipment Program (VESEP) grants of almost \$15 million, which will help volunteer emergency service agencies to purchase equipment.

The Harcourt brigade received a new medium tanker that was purchased with a \$320,000 VESEP grant, just in time for the summer season.

Since 2015, the State Government has provided more than \$123 million in VESEP grants to volunteers around the state. Groups can apply for a grant up to \$150,000 excluding GST,

with the Government providing \$2 for every \$1 of funding contributed by the local volunteer group.

Ms Edwards said, "Congratulations to the Harcourt Brigade and all the volunteer groups receiving grants. It's a pleasure to see first-hand the benefits programs like this provide for our dedicated volunteers."

### **New Mayor**



LODDON River Ward Councillor Matthew Driscoll is the new Mount Alexander Shire Council Mayor. He was elected by Councillors for a one-year term at last week's Council meeting, and served as Deputy Mayor for the 2022/2023 term.

### **Tower Turns 100**



IN less than two months, the lookout tower on top of Mt Tarrengower turns 100. It was officially opened on 26 January 1924, after being erected by the Advance Maldon Association.

The tower was originally an old poppet head that was bought for a song and transported from Bendigo to Maldon by train. Then came the hard part: transporting parts of the tower up the mountain using horse power and then fitting it all together.

Lit up at Easter, used as a fire lookout tower in summer and providing panoramic views, the tower is a popular place for tourists and locals to visit. # **Baringhup Permit Application Refused**

IN line with advice from Council officers, Council at its November meeting voted to refuse a planning permit application for a two-lot subdivision (dwelling excision) at Simmons Road in Baringhup.

The application called for a 183.8 hectare block to be subdivided into two lots of 1.5 hectares and 182.3 hectares.

Reasons for the refusal included the view that the planning permit application would not provide for the use of land for agriculture or encourage the retention of productive agricultural land.

Following the vote, Councillor Cordy called a Point of Order, pointing out that the applicant has a right to build an additional dwelling on the property due to the property being over 100 acres in size. The order was taken on notice.

### **Running An Event - Pros and Cons**

UNPREDICTABLE weather, compliance issues, increasing costs, the ever-present prospect of a COVID wave - these problems and more are faced by event organisers. As these problems become more difficult to negotiate, is there a possibility that the region might lose some of its events?

Let's hope not! Maldon and the readership area thrive on events. There's the granddaddy of them all, the Maldon Easter Fair, plus the Maldon & Baringhup Agricultural Show, the Folkie, the Twilight Dinner, Maldon In Winter, the Campdraft, the Baringhup Ball, Newstead Live, the Maldon, Newstead and Baringhup Markets and more.

To examine the logistics of holding a public event, the Times spoke to Mark Blythe last week, while he was in the process of preparing the grounds out at the Maldon race course for the Maldon Swap Meet.

Mark is the uncrowned king of Maldon events. He has run the annual Maldon Antique Fair since 2009, was instrumental in kicking off the Townwide Garage Sale in the same year, has been running two Maldon Swap Meets a year since 2014 and has also been holding an Antique Fair at Campbells Creek each year.

There's not a lot that Mark doesn't know about running an event, and he's happy to share. As well as having more one-liners than most stand-up comedians, Mark also plays the long game. So the interview with the Times was funny and included a good yarn or two. It was also highly instructive.

Mark began his events career when he put his hand up to run an antique fair in Maldon on behalf of local business and tourism association Maldon Inc. "My first budget was \$350, and I blew it on one advert in Markets & Fairs Magazine," Mark said. "Eight people and a dog read it, and the dog was eating his dinner on it at the time."

But the people came, and appreciated the green, green grass at the Bill Woodfull reserve, where the Antique Fair was held. "It was held during the Millennium drought," Mark said. "It was a huge success, a great fundraiser for the MFNC and

having an event to go to."

Advice for running a successful event?

Finding a good venue is the hardest thing, according to Mark. "I'm lucky that I have a couple of great venues in Maldon," he said. "The Bill Woodfull reserve, of course. And the Maldon racecourse, where the other users accommodate my events with good grace."

Holding an open-air event is, however, always fraught with danger and Mark believes that climate change is taking its toll. "There's no such thing as a viable weather forecast.

Is it, or isn't it, going to rain? It's a real lottery. We've had everything from 40-degree heat to a mini-tornado. That's one reason why I'm looking at holding

> a couple of events up in Bendigo, under cover. It'd be great to do it in Castlemaine, but there aren't any large buildings that are suitable."

Next piece of advice: keep it simple. "If you decide to have alcohol at the event, then it's a whole different ballgame," Mark said. "You need security guards, just for a start. And no fireworks - that's also fraught with problems."

You need to have completed your paperwork for the Shire so that your event is approved. That requires being compliant across a number of areas, including insurance, fire precautions, emergency exits, first aid and appropriate vehicle movements within pedestrian areas. But wait, there's more. In the near future, Mark

needs to attend a three-day Events Safety Officer Course in Melbourne at a cost of \$1,900. "And before that, I have to pass my Certificate III in First Aid," he said. A complicated list of compliance issues, the risk of rain or heat, the hassle of dealing with hundreds of fickle stallholders,

"Adrenaline," he said. "I really enjoy the challenge. Look, when it works, it really works and I get a real thrill out of that. There's the odd fair where you barely break even, but you have to forget about that and move on. Ultimately, it's all worthwhile."



### **Council adopts Waste Management Strategy**



MOUNT Alexander Shire Council has taken a significant step forward in environmental management by adopting its new Waste Management Strategy 2023-2033. The strategy, approved on Tuesday 21 November, sets the stage for a decade of sustainable waste-handling practices, emphasising reduction, reuse, and recycling.

The Council's plan is built around four key goals: curtailing waste generation, boosting resource recovery, fostering a local circular economy, and minimising the environmental impacts of waste management. These targets align with the broader vision of creating a more sustainable and environmentally responsible community.


Central to this strategy's development was the input from local residents, particularly the Community Waste Reference Group, who provided critical insights. Mayor Cr Matthew Driscoll highlighted the community's vital role in shaping this vision, stressing the importance of collaborative efforts in rethinking consumption and disposal habits.

# Railway Hotel - Castlemaine



### The Maldon and Shelbourne Railways

IF you're interested in local history or are a railway tragic, here's the book for you: A History of the Maldon and Shelbourne Railways. Written by local historian Ken James and railway enthusiasts David Langley, Malcolm Pascoe and Chris Wurr, it's an absolute brick of a book (470 pages).

There will be a VGR-hosted book launch on Sunday 3 December at 9.45am, which will be held on Platform No. 3 at the Castlemaine Railway Station.

The Castlemaine-Maldon rail line was opened in 1884 and up to four passenger services operated on weekdays. In 1941, the passenger service was discontinued, but the line was open to goods traffic until 1976. The line was brought back to life by the Victorian Goldfields Railway, which began operating in the 1980s.

Many *Times* readers may not know that from 1891 until its official closure in 1970, there was a train line running from Maldon out to Shelbourne, with one stop at Bradford. The original plan was for this line to extend out to Laanecoorie, but this never happened. The last train on the Maldon-Shelbourne line ran on 8 January 1969, the day that a bushfire destroyed bridges and other rail infrastructure.


Meticulously researched, full of detail and with copious photos, maps, diagrams and tables, *A History of the Maldon and Shelbourne Railways* is an excellent read. To say that it is a comprehensive book is an understatement; the amount of detail that it contains is extraordinary. The chapter on the historic wooden bridges between Castlemaine and Maldon is outstanding.

In addition to a raft of technical detail, there are many insights into the lives of those touched by the railways - the navvies, the engine drivers and other train staff, the men and women who worked at the railway stations and crossings, and the locals who used the trains.

Here are a few snippets of interest that are contained in ne book:

- The original site for the station was to be opposite the Beehive Stores (where Robert Cox Motors is) in High Street.
- The opening celebrations for the Maldon Railway Station were huge: a triumphal arch, the official party taken to the Butts Reserve and the Shire Hall, and inspection of the school (where there were 660 pupils!), buns and lollies for the kids at the Shire Hall, a visit to the Athenaeum and its museum, all followed by a banquet attended by 120 men (no women!) at the Masonic Hall (the old Royal Theatre).
- In 1890, a train was stopped by a huge swarm of locusts.
   The wheels simply wouldn't grip on the rails.
- There were nine gatekeepers' cottages between Castlemaine and Maldon. The gatekeeper's job was to close the gates when the train approached, and to open them after the train had passed. In 1892, at the Campbells

- Creek gateway, the gatekeeper's wife was killed when she rushed to open the gates for an oncoming train. Deaths on the railways were not uncommon.
- Race meetings and football matches, excursions to the seaside, the Easter Fair - there were special trains for many events. The 1885 Christmas Day train was decorated with flowers and evergreens, with a Merry Christmas sign at the front.



- While the Castlemaine-Maldon rail line was opened with much hoopla, the opening of the Maldon-Shelbourne line was a low-key event. The engine driver of the first train to use the line was, apparently, drunk. The train was welcomed at Shelbourne by 150 people, who came from the surrounding countryside.
- A report in *The Age* about wasteful use of public money in relation to the railway network: "To the solitary individual who lives within sight of the Bradford station it is a source of daily wonder why it was ever built, and the unhappy station master located in that lonesome and desolate region must bewail the fate that keeps him here. The popular belief is that the station master does not take more than 5 shillings per week in money collected..."
- In 1894, the Maldon-Shelbourne line was already running at a loss. Revenue for that year was 314 pounds, while costs were a staggering 3,030 pounds.
- A 1916 photo of the Shelbourne Station yard shows a young Vernon Duncombe (1904-1970) standing on a tractor, with his father in the background. Vernon's mother Beatrice died at his birth. Vernon and his father lived in a weatherboard hut on iron wheels which the traction engine pulled as it went around the district

- working at various jobs. He had three older sisters and in between working with his father he went to school at West Shelbourne.
- In the 1930s, there was a spate of robberies at the Maldon Railway Station.
- In 1942, a silo was built at Shelbourne Station, with an oats shed built some time later. The Station was an important point for the shipment of grain.

On 'Red Wednesday' on 8 January 1969, the train arrived at Shelbourne to pick up wagons of wheat. At noon, a fire began at Baringhup

and a decision was made to leave the wheat wagons behind and try to beat the fire back to Maldon. The train crew was lucky to escape. The train stayed just ahead of the fire, with parts of the line and bridges burning behind. Fourteen bridges and 12,000 railway sleepers were destroyed, and it was nine months before the wagons were recovered from Shelbourne. The fire was finally brought under control at South Ravenswood later that night, having burnt out 60,000 acres. And that was the end of the Shelbourne line.



### **Human Rights and UNDRIP**

DJAARA history is embedded in the landscape here and embedded in 'Country' as a broader concept. This year I had the privilege of being guided by senior Djaara Elder Uncle Rick Nelson - winding through streets, through coppiced forest, along rocky slopes, and along remnant wetland.

Locally this place is sometimes referred to as 'upside down country', a reference to the aftermath of mining, but First Peoples history pre-colonisation, is still told through the earth, rock, trees and other life and by First Peoples who have survived settler colonialism. Ancient and more recent knowledge is shared and culture is continued.

Djaara are here caring for people and Country, having never ceded sovereignty. I walk with respect for Elders past and present, their efforts towards self-determination and the love they put into the young people and future generations.

Human Rights Day, on 10 December, honours the United Nations General Assembly's adoption and proclamation in 1948 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). The day's theme this year is: 'Consolidating and Sustaining Human Rights Culture into the Future'.

Learning about Australian history over my years growing on this continent, it has long been made clear that Australia, land of the 'fair go' as has been so often asserted, did often not reflect the realities of ongoing colonialism. I've lived for most

of my life in a settler colonial state. Makarrata and conciliation requires that settler colonialists unlearn persistently dominant false narratives and listen not only to stories of survival but also of culture; what once was and what still is. Truth Telling requires listening to First Peoples as they continue the culture and resistance of their ancestors, strengthen communities, and share their deep connections to Country.

The UN has long marked the failure of Australia's national agreement to Close The Gap - gaps which have broadened in many areas since that agreement was made.

While human rights are universal rights, the UN adopted the Declaration of Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) in 2007, having acknowledged that there are specific areas of need affecting the fulfilment of indigenous peoples' rights. The very substantial negotiations towards the declaration included voices of indigenous peoples from around the world. UNDRIP was endorsed by the Australian government in 2009, but there is much to be done for Australia to live up to this declaration.

The central themes of UNDRIP include:

- the right to self determination
- the right to be recognised as distinct peoples
- the right to free, prior and informed consentthe right to be free from discrimination

There is a marked need to include UNDRIP in our legal and political systems. The path towards Voice (constitutionally enshrined or not), Treaty and Truth complements the principles embedded in UNDRIP. So far, five Australian states and territories have committed to Treaty processes since the release of the Uluru Statement.

At a state level in Victoria, Voice is marked by the First People's Assembly, formed in 2019. The need for Truth Telling then saw the establishment of the Yoorook Justice Commission in 2021. Processes towards a statewide Treaty and more localised Treaties are also underway.

Djaara (Dja Dja Wurrung People) achieved Registered Aboriginal Party status through self-determination in 2013 when the historic Recognition and the Settlement Agreement with the state government was signed. Through Djaara, many great things have since been accomplished. In November, Djaara celebrated the 10-year anniversary of that agreement.

'Yapenya' (Dja Dja Wurrung) - to sing, to dance, to gather, to reflect, to celebrate.'

'We are creating positive outcomes for our community, in our local community. When Dja Dja Wurrung People are empowered, great things happen – not just for our own communities, but for all. As we come together in November to celebrate, we do so in honour of our Ancestors, with gratitude for the wisdom of our Elders, and with a profound commitment to creating a brighter path for the next generation.'

Well, it depends. For example, what area or place pops into their head first? And what pops into their head first depends on who they are, what they want to do, where they've been previously, what they've heard about a place - and on it goes. As consumers, nothing is ever considered in a vacuum - potential visitors have options of where to go in regional Victoria. Competition for the tourist dollar between regions and towns and activities and attractions is alive and well.

An 'umbrella' Destination Management Plan (DMP) is underway with the aim to help align Local Area Action Plans (LAAPs) of four shire councils. 1. City of Greater Bendigo 2. Mount Alexander 3. Loddon and 4. Central Goldfields. As a result, in time, there'll be even more bums on seats, feet on streets, and smiles on faces.

The role of a DMP is to unite all tourism stakeholders, including the community, under a collaborative vision for the future of tourism. The DMP also aims to uncover particular strategic opportunities to support a 'bigger picture' vision.

The next stage of the development of the DMP for Mount Alexander Shire occurred last week in Castlemaine. Tourism businesses and organisations were invited to attend a tourism roundtable/workshop. Locally, the Maldon Museum & Archives was represented, as was Victorian Goldfields Railways (VGR), Maldon Inc (the business association of Maldon), the *Tarrangower Times*, along with other business, heritage, environmental, accommodation, sport/activity groups.

During the sessions, facilitators had participants explore the challenges and opportunities for tourism for the Mount Alexander region, along with specific ideas and initiatives for each of their local communities or specific groups.

Following the workshop, Mount Alexander Shire Council's Manager Economy and Culture Merryn Tinkler said the council aims for the document to lead the tourism direction for the next number of years. "The final document will be a suggested roadmap. It's not saying that everything that is put forward in the final document is going to be absolutely unequivocally done by 2030 - it's a suggested roadmap."

In the meantime, the Mount Alexander stakeholder engagement sessions held last week in Castlemaine are now in progress within the other three regions.



extraordinary nest.

Woven from slender grass stems and leaf fragments, the exterior of the structure is laced with spent wattle flowers. This nest has a small portico over the entrance and hangs from narrow branchlets of a sapling River Red Gum. It was amazing to watch the adults arriving on a regular basis as the nest swayed in a moderate breeze, alighting in front of the nest before dashing in to tend to the occupants. I suspect the eggs have just hatched - there was no obvious sign of food suggesting that tiny nestlings are inside.

### **Library News**

THE library has a number of books that have until recently been classified as 'Not for Loan'. A few months ago we began the slow process of reviewing these books and updating records to make as many as possible more accessible to our members.

Observant visitors to the library may have noticed that a set of shelves, which have for some time been labelled 'Work in Progress', are now nearly cleared. Yes! We found time for a blitz of work. On these shelves, we were excited to find books devoted to letters from the Australian colonial era and beyond. They include a gem published in 1979 entitled Advice to a Young Lady in the Colonies, which is the reproduction of a letter sent to Maria Macarthur (married to John Macarthur's nephew, Hannibal) by 'Mrs E' who is believed to have been her godmother. Another, Life Lines (1992), is a collection of women's letters and diaries written between 1788 and 1840. Edited by Patricia Clarke and Dale Spender, the letters are by women from all walks of colonial life. My Dear Betsy (1993) is a compilation by William Hirst of letters arranged chronologically from 1771 to 1944 written by well-known figures such as William Bligh, Elizabeth Macarthur, Banjo Paterson, Miles Franklin and Lloyd Rees. Then there is the beautifully presented book In Her Own Words by Robyn Walsh, which is a collection of the writings of Elizabeth Macquarie from 1801 to 1835 accompanied by sumptuous photos and other

Finally, there are two copies of *Letters from Victorian Pioneers* by Thomas Francis Bride, which contains 50 letters from squatters and other early settlers carried to England by Charles Joseph La Trobe in 1854. The earlier publication will be kept in the Reserve Collection, but the later edition is available for borrowing. All five of these recently 'liberated' books can now be found in our Essays, Letters and Diaries Collection. They are sure to delight anyone interested in a personal, historical or social insight into the lives of convicts, settlers and their colonial masters.

### **Book Reviews**

The Good Wife of Bath by Karen Brooks, 2021

A provocative, immersive medieval novel starring one of literature's most unforgettable characters in her own words: Chaucer's bold and libidinous Wife of Bath.

England, 1364. When married off at the age of 12 to an elderly farmer, brazen redheaded Eleanor quickly realises it won't matter what she says or does; God is not on her side or any poor woman's for that matter. But then again, Eleanor was born under the joint signs of Venus and Mars, making her both a lover and a fighter. Aided by a head for business (and a surprisingly kind husband), Eleanor manages to turn her first marriage into success, and she rises through society from a cast-off farm girl to a woman of fortune who becomes a trusted friend of the social-climbing poet Geoffrey Chaucer. But more marriages follow, some happy, some not, several pilgrimages, many lovers, murder, mayhem, and many turns of fortune's wheel as Eleanor pursues the one thing that all women want: control of their own lives.

### All That I Am by Anna Funder, 2011 LARGE PRINT edition

All That I Am is a masterful and exhilarating exploration of bravery and betrayal, of the risks and sacrifices some people make for their beliefs, and of heroism hidden in the most unexpected places.

When 18-year-old Ruth Becker visits her cousin Dora in Munich in 1923, she meets the love of her life, the dashing young journalist Hans Wesemann, and eagerly joins in the heady activities of the militant political left in Germany. Ten years later, Ruth and Hans are married and living in Weimar Berlin when Hitler is elected chancellor of Germany. Together with Dora and her lover, Ernst Toller, the celebrated poet and self-doubting revolutionary, the four become hunted outlaws overnight and are forced to flee to London. Inspired by the fearless Dora to breathtaking acts of courage, the friends risk betrayal and deceit as they dedicate themselves to a dangerous mission: to inform the British government of the very real Nazi threat to which it remains wilfully blind. *All That I Am* is the heartbreaking story of these extraordinary people who discover that Hitler's reach extends much further than they had thought.

### Koh-I-Noor: the History of the World's most Infamous Diamond by William Dalrymple and Anita Anand, 2016

The first comprehensive and authoritative history of the Koh-I-Noor, arguably the most celebrated and mythologised

jewel in the world. On 29 March 1849, the 10-year-old Maharajah of the Punjab was ushered into the magnificent Mirrored Hall at the centre of the great Fort in Lahore. There, in a public ceremony, the frightened but dignified child handed over to the British East India Company in a formal Act of Submission to Queen Victoria not only swathes of the richest land in India but also arguably the single most valuable object in the subcontinent: the celebrated Koh-I-Noor diamond, the Mountain of Light. The history of the Koh-I-Noor that was then commissioned by the British may have been one woven together from the gossip of Delhi Bazaars, but it was to have become the accepted version. Only now is it finally challenged, freeing the diamond from the fog of mythology that has clung to it for so long. The resulting history is one of greed, murder, torture, colonialism and appropriation through an impressive slice of South and Central Asian history. It ends with the jewel in its current controversial setting: in the crown of Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother.

We did welcome our afternoon tea break to ease our minds a little and the warm sausage rolls were well received. Thank you team Maldon Hotel, once again.



# BLAST FROM THE PAST

THE BLACK TROUGH



WHEN retired businessman George Bills died in Melbourne in 1927, he left about £70,000 to provide public horse troughs throughout Australia. Eventually, about 700 pre-cast concrete troughs were produced each with the inscription 'Donated by Annis & George Bills Australia'. Annis was George's wife who had died in 1910. She shared her husband's concerns for animal welfare.

In 1933, the Maldon Shire Council accepted the offer of a 'Bills' trough, which was delivered in March 1934. The Council then resolved that it should replace the old 'Black Trough' located near the north end of High Street at the start of the Bridgewater Road. When the Shire engineer implemented this decision, there was a torrent of protest.


In 1906 George Lakey had brought the 'Black Trough' to Maldon from Dr Harry Atkinson's property at Shelbourne. It was a timber trough large enough to comfortably water three draught horses at once. With time it had become something of a local landmark. In contrast the 'Bills' trough was described by the Tarrangower Times as a 'beautiful little trough' just big enough to bathe a dog in. The Times suggested that as the new trough incorporated a drinking fountain and a smaller trough for dogs it should have been placed near the Beehive. There it could serve the town traffic and be handy for

Dissatisfied with the Council's performance some ratepayers had formed an association to contest the upcoming election. They made the 'Black Trough' one of their election issues and called on the Council to reinstate it. They claimed that, as the Council had neither owned the trough or paid for its upkeep, it had no right to remove it. Although their candidate was not elected, it seems that the trough was eventually reinstated.

In the 1950s concerns were regularly raised that cattle allowed to graze on the Commons congregate around the town's public troughs. In 1957 the cattle gathering around a black trough at the northern end of High Street were causing a hazard for motorists and there were calls to have the trough moved. At about the same time the 'Bills' trough was in High Street in front of the Shire Gardens. It was often cited as the reason for cattle wandering around the town centre.

It appears that the 'Bills' trough did eventually replace the 'Black Trough' for a second time. In the 1980s the 'Bills' trough was again located at the northern end of High Street. It was later moved from there to its current site in front of the Hardware Store when Geoff and Shirley Little opened their blacksmith shop and began giving tours of the town with their Clydesdales, Terry and Tangles.






Racing commenced on Saturday afternoon under challenging conditions with shifting winds and strong gusts and dark brooding skies.




