It was quite the gathering at the Mount Tarrengower tower's 100th birthday last Friday, especially when you consider that it was an impromptu event put together in a matter of days. There was a crowd, three fire tower operators, a politician, speeches, a plaque and a cake.

Former fire tower operator Peter Skilbeck pointed out that he had spent almost a third of his life - 26 years - working on top of the tower.

According to Peter, it was only five months between the

time that the tower (an old poppet head) was purchased in Bendigo, construction was completed and the tower was opened to the public on 26 January, 1924. It was no easy task. "These days, it'd take longer than that to get a planning permit for the job!" Peter joked.

The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) owns the tower and upgraded it in 2018 at the cost of \$1.48 million. Peter paid tribute to the part that Bendigo West Member Maree Edwards played in securing funds for the upgrade. "At one stage, it looked like the tower

might have been dispensed with altogether," he said.

Peter described how in the early years the first and then the second levels of the tower were used to look out for smoke on days of high fire danger. It wasn't until the 1980s that a cabin was placed on the top level.

On duty on Black Saturday in 2009, Peter experienced 47 degree heat in the cabin on top of the tower and 135kmh winds. "All I could see was dust until the wind died down," he said. "Then I could see the fires in Bendigo and Redesdale. I spent

Some of these actions include:

- Committing to becoming carbon neutral by 2025
- Achieving 100% renewable electricity for Council operations
- Upgrading street lights to low-energy LEDs across the shire
- Starting the transition to an electric fleet
- Council has capped the Castlemaine landfill
- Advocated for an increase in energy efficient standards for new homes through the National Construction Code
- Participating in the Elevating Environmentally Sustainable Development Targets Planning Policy

Duck hunting gets green light



THE State Labor Government has given the green light for duck hunting to continue, with the season starting on 10 April and finishing on 5 June.

Duck hunters will need to undergo extra training in marksmanship and take part in an Indigenous cultural awareness program.

The decision flies in the face of a State Parliamentary Inquiry which recommended that the sport be banned.

The only other states or territories that permit duck hunting are South Australia, Tasmania and the Northern Territory.

Council Grants program

The Community Grants program opened on 22 January and supports local groups and individuals who are developing new and emerging projects. Two funding streams are available: small grants, which are up to \$3,000 and partnership grants, which are up to \$10,000.

The Event Grants program opens on Monday 19 February and supports groups who are running public events. There are three funding streams available: \$1,000, \$2,000 and \$3,000.

In addition to the Community Grants and Event Grants programs, there are also Quick Response Event Grants, which are available all year round and can provide up to \$500 per event.

Economic Development Strategy

WHAT does an ideal economy look like for you and your community? That's the question Mount Alexander Shire Council is asking residents to consider as it develops its next Economic Development Strategy.

"When we say 'economy' we mean the combined work we all do to make a living for ourselves, our families, our communities and places," said Merryn Tinkler, Council's Manager Economy and Culture. "This includes both paid and unpaid work. We want to develop an economic strategy that is not just about jobs and growth but considers the overall wellbeing of our community and environment, first and foremost."

Council is working with the Castlemaine Institute to develop the strategy, which will define how the economy can be reshaped to be:

- **Regenerative** – working within the limits of the planet while meeting the needs of all people's health and wellbeing.
- **Inclusive** – everyone has access to everything needed to live a dignified life.
- **Healthy** – health of people and the environment.
- **Connected** – to each other, the environment and Country.

As part of the strategy's development, Council held a number of workshops and interviews with targeted specific groups within the community to get their feedback. Information collected during those workshops will be used in conjunction with desktop research, and input from the wider community.

Tower's 100th birthday



Despite the short notice, a good crowd turned out to celebrate the tower's 100th birthday.

the entire day talking to planes, relaying messages. There has been a vast improvement in radio communications since then."

It may be a solitary job, but a fire tower operator is also part of a team, with other towers that can be brought into play. The tower operator is also in radio contact with local brigades.

Maldon Museum & Archives President Derek Reid revealed that in order to make Maldon a more attractive destination in the early 1920s there were plans afoot to either build a chairlift up the Mount from Fountain Street or to construct a lookout tower.

"The lookout tower came out a winner," Derek said. "There was a thriving second market in mining equipment in those days, and so the tower was purchased in Bendigo and shipped down to Maldon by rail. Then a road had to be constructed for horse teams to drag the tower pieces up the Mount."

What must have been almost half the town - 400 to 500 people - were there on the day that State Premier and local Member H.S.W. Lawson officially opened the tower. In 1924, Miss McArthur donated the directional plaque that can be seen on the first level of the tower.

Maldon Easter Fair President Peter Thompson spoke of

the tradition of lighting up the tower for Easter. "It really is a beacon for Maldon at Easter," he said. Kerosene lamps were eventually replaced with electrical lighting, and Peter acknowledged the part that electricians Bill Telford and son Chris played over the years in rigging up the lights each Easter. These days, Casey Cain does the job.

"The lights are a spectacular sight, and everyone knows that the tower is the Easter Bunny's house," Peter said.

Bendigo West Member Maree Edwards spoke of the historical and cultural importance of the tower, as well as the part that it plays in the State's fire management network. She also spoke about strong community support that Maldon residents have for their natural as well as their built environment.

"It's a great honour to have been invited here today," she said, "and I'll certainly be bringing all of my 11 grandchildren to Maldon at Easter to show them the Easter Bunny's house!"

Following the speeches, Ms Edwards unveiled a plaque and everyone was invited to enjoy a piece of Lil Skilbeck's excellent chocolate and strawberry cake.

Here's hoping the tower is going strong in 2124!

DUE to compliance issues with Council, Sandy Creek Clydesdales owners Matthew and Jaimie Thompson say they have been forced to cancel much of their business activities. This includes planned Valentine’s Day events as well as harness clinics, show prep workshops, dining carts and study tours - anything, in fact, which involves members of the public visiting the property on Sandy Creek Road.

The well-known and much-loved enterprise earned not just one, but two awards at Mount Alexander Shire Council’s Business Awards last year. Sandy Creek Clydesdales won the People’s Choice Award at Mount Alexander Shire Council’s business awards and Matthew took out the Young Achiever Award.

The *Times* spoke to Jaimie Thompson, who said that they were giving serious thought to packing up and leaving the district to run their business elsewhere. According to Jaimie, their business model requires them to obtain a Place of Assembly planning permit. She believes that this requires a change

in the land use classification.

“We dived into just what changing the land use zoning would require,” Jaimie said. “We found out that we would need to do studies that include traffic management, parking, sound and also one that addresses the indigenous overlay. When we discovered that the studies might cost over \$50,000, we scrapped that idea.”

For the past few years or so, Matthew and Jaimie have welcomed visitors to their property - to attend a workshop, have a carriage ride or simply a tour of the property. “But now we’ve been told to stop,” Jaimie said. They have received three Council fines in recent months.

While it is not possible for Council to comment on the specifics of any matter under enforcement, a Council spokesperson said:

“In order to safely hold events and congregations of people on private land that minimise any risk to the environment or have any other negative impact, there are certain permissions

required under State Government legislation and the Mount Alexander Planning Scheme.

“In line with these regulations, a Place of Assembly planning permit is required.

“Council has provided information to the Sandy Creek Clydesdale Stud on these requirements, which has included advice on how the required information can be obtained.”

On a brighter note, the Thompsons took four of their horses to the Werribee Park National Equestrian Centre recently for the National Clydesdale and Heavy Horse Festival.

“Well, it was four and a half horses actually, because one of them has a foal at foot,” Jaimie said. “We also took two dogs and two kids, so it was quite a trip! We didn’t get a placing, but we still did well. A lot of feathers in our caps, and a lot of learning took place.”

HOW'S BUSINESS?

#10 of a series: MANet Co-Convenors Jenny Merkus and Catherine Tait.

MANet (Maldon Artist Network) was established in 2012. Its mantra was Connecting artists. Fostering creativity. "Our first meetings were at the 1856 Penny school that overlooks Maldon in Church Street, which was a lovely gallery - just completely beautiful to be at."

It brought a lot of artists together to talk, think, be creative, and share," said MANet Co-Convenor Jenny Merkus. "My background is as a producer and an organiser. So, I'm always

thinking about how MANet can expand in a way that excites people." An art walk was the first event MANet did to make art be and feel part of the broader community. "We walked the streets and visited every shop. I think 52 businesses got involved. There was great community."

So, how's business?

Co-Convenor Catherine Tait said the MANet Art Focus Gallery opened in March last year. "The gallery provides a

space for artists to showcase their art and receive feedback from their peers. Like any 'business' there's a need to balance financial considerations with your goals. MANet has managed to overcome many challenges, and continues to thrive as a supportive and inclusive community for artists."

Time to upturn a letter. Jenny, you first...

The letters M, A, L, D, O, N were face down in front of Jenny and Catherine. They take turns to reveal a letter that triggers a conversation.



N. Night.

Jenny: "The night sky, the bush, the beautiful scenery. I'm a landscape painter mostly, and I'm inspired mostly about Maldon. I walk the mountain and I paint rocks, and I paint lots of skies from my back window. So, night, day, dusk,

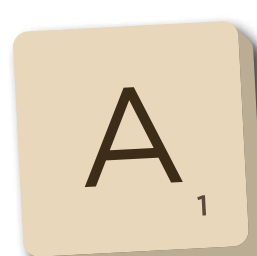
dawn. They're all things that inspire me. I'm also inspired by, of course, the rest of Maldon - the historic part of it. And its community."



M. Magnificent.

Jenny: "It's just magnificent really to have achieved so much, especially now with the Gallery. Like any good business, our motivation isn't about money. It's about what you do and how you do it. In our case, it's about art itself. Do that well and you are rewarded. It's truly magnificent.

So it's something beyond a business, it's about the essence of life and being in the flow. That's why we have really good exhibitions - because the art is always quite 'out there', it's very good."



A. Accepting.

Jenny: "That's really part of what we're about - accepting all genres, all artists, all stages. We're absolutely inclusive of all the diversities in the arts. Most artists are very eccentric, so we're inclusive of the diversities in people, too." Catherine: "We're all at different stages. It's an individual journey.

But as a group, we really encourage and we really recognise the different stages people are at. This means we are able to advise and carry them through the process."



L. Learning.

Catherine: "I always love developing and learning things. I learned how to put my art courses online. I learned how to look at colour in life differently. I'm constantly learning different techniques in my painting, then sharing

them. Opening the Gallery means learning things from others like organisational capacity - how to better run things and do project management plans. Artists are not usually naturally-gifted organisers, so we've had to find techniques to make that work. We learn off each other and lean on each other as well."



D. Drawing.

Catherine: "Yeah, that's how I first started. I was an art student. I was a darn good drawer, but I was very intimidated by colour - it was a hurdle I had to get over. Then I started doing water colour, and that was my beginning in painting. I was

very intimidated by colour because I didn't have the knowledge of colour. But as soon as I started to get into colour and understand it, the whole world opened up for me. Then I discovered there are a lot of people who love colour, but they can't draw. So, now I teach drawing. Sometimes you just have to step out of your comfort zone."



O. Orange.

Catherine: "Orange is one of my favourite colours and a prominent colour in my artwork. It's a warm, inspirational colour. And that's the feel we want for the Gallery. It's about being warm... warm, welcoming, accepting, and inspirational. And that's why we are committed to the network and its continued growth."

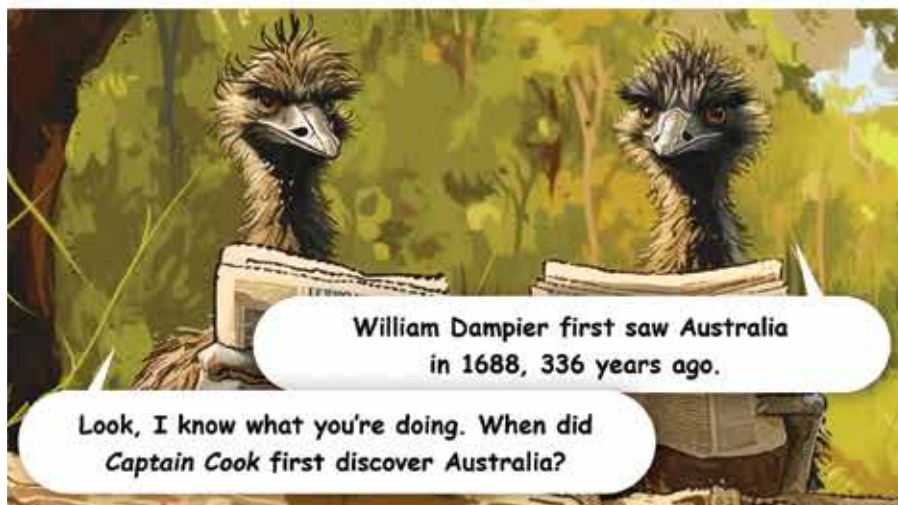

Ghosts I Have Known

DON'T you love stories that begin like this:

It was a wintry night. All day, great waves had pounded the Cornish coast. The wind tore in from the sea, howling or screaming across the headland, buffeting the trees and rattling the weathered shutters of the old inn that stood two miles from the tiny village of Benhawden.

In the smoke-filled bar, under the low timber-beamed ceiling, villagers, most of whom were fishermen, listened to the tormented groans of the wind and watched the rain that was hurled in gusts against the thick glass. The men were drinking ale or mulled wine and telling stories to pass the time. All felt afraid to leave the warmth and friendship of the bar for their homes. No-one wanted to venture out into the dark on such a devilish night.

Each man told his tale. When they finished, an old man - a stranger - who had been sitting silently by the fire, seemingly absorbed by the cruel dance of flames, spoke for the first time.

'Ghosts,' he said with quiet scorn. 'Tales to frighten children to their beds! But I have a tale. It's a queer story, but it happened to me.'

As though to give emphasis to his words, the wind gave a sudden, piercing shriek and fell silent for the first time in many hours. Several villagers started, one of them covering his embarrassment with a short, barking laugh.

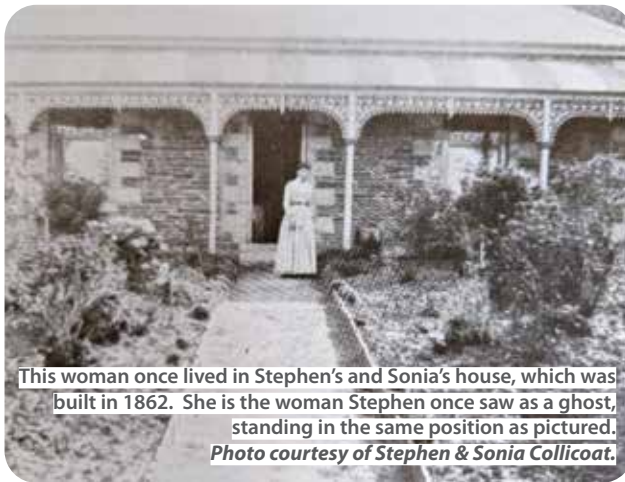
Yet each man shivered as though icy fingers had for a moment stroked the nape of his neck.

And so on. Have I hooked you yet?

I was 40 when I first heard a ghost.

It was the second time Sonia, my wife, and I stayed in Maldon, a town that was to become our home.

We hired an old house for several days. Built in 1868, its grandest and most original feature was the main bedroom. The room was noticeably colder than the rest of the house. Not caring for the room, we slept in the second bedroom. Around 3am we woke to the sound of a heavy tread in the corridor. The steps, which sounded as though made by a man wearing boots, continued for an hour. We weren't exactly scared, but nor did we open the locked door to investigate. Later, the owner told us other guests had heard the steps. Because the

house had little recorded history, she couldn't suggest who restlessly paced the corridor.

Ghosts are as much part of Maldon as the double row of elms leading into the small village.

All mining towns have tragic stories. Underground explosions, cave-ins, poisonous gas leaks, and flooding shafts are common events. Life above the ground in Victorian times was scarcely safer. There is a small cemetery close to Maldon where miners' children, many of whom died from typhoid, are buried. Most of the miners couldn't afford a headstone, so often, a cairn of rocks marks a grave.

The farmhouse where we live today has its own ghosts. Built in 1862, the house witnessed weddings, births and deaths.

Once Sonia and I were seated in our kitchen toward evening when we heard a soft voice calling 'Sonia'. We thought at first a friend may have called, but no-one was there. We also live far from our neighbours. When the call began again, we realised it was a child's voice. We now feel sure it was the ghost of a child who died in the house.

Other times, we have smelt pipe tobacco or cigarette smoke. Neither of us are smokers.

One evening, as I returned to the house after gardening,

I saw a young woman in Victorian dress watching me. As I approached, she faded from view. I later realised from an old photo she was a daughter of George Greene, original owner of our house. She died over 80 years ago.

My most uncanny experience, however, occurred not in our present home but in a small cottage we bought and lived in on weekends, renovating it for sale. The cottage had a grim history.

Many of Maldon's young men went to serve in WWI, but the cottage owner's son hid away from Maldon townsfolk in the nearby Nuggetty Ranges. This was because he clearly felt the pressure of others thinking him a shirker and coward, although there was no compulsory military call-up. He came back home each night to be fed by his mother.

The young man lived rough for some months, but the strain became too great. Returning to the cottage while his mother was absent, the young man committed suicide.

Decades later, the cottage still held a memory of that time.

I had been painting the main bedroom. To escape the smell of fresh paint, Sonia and I slept in bunk beds in the second bedroom. Normally, we never slept in this room.

Around 3am, I woke. I felt someone gently shake me by the shoulder. Thinking it was Sonia, I asked what she wanted, but in the dim light saw her asleep on the other side of the room. It was strange. I knew I hadn't been sleeping nor had I imagined the touch. It suggested both sadness and sympathy. I think it was the boy's mother waking him before he went bush.

So there it is. My current experience with ghosts. No severed heads, clanking chains or tormented groans. None of these are a tale that the old man would have doubtless told, but my experiences did happen.

Anyway, who in their right mind would accept the word of a stranger in a Cornish inn on a night when demons roamed abroad?

A PRIZE WORTHY OF THE GAME

THE Maldon Chess Championship was held as in tradition at Berryman's Café 30 Main Street Maldon on

Thursday 25 January. (Newcomers to the Maldon Chess Group are always welcome, 10am at the Café.) The finals saw the Up Starts team defeat The Olde Farts by a close-run eight wins and one draw out of nine games. An Emergency Meeting of the Olde Farts afterwards decided that next time they enlist in their team an aging Russian Grandmaster or, if it be cheaper, employ a pre-game hitman from Melbourne.

The prize snatched from the hands of The Olde Farts was a hand-crafted ceramic chess set donated by Galen Sartore. The multi-talented Galen Sartore has created a range of such splendid chess sets, and one of these was some time ago donated to the Victorian Chess Club after a discussion with its President, International Master Leonid Sandler.

The Maldon Chess Group is very fortunate as Galen gifted us his set of 'Renaissance' pieces, ranging from the regal king to the volatile queen and from the obdurate bishops to the stolid pawns. The dashing knights remind me of one of the pretentious members of the Up Starts whom I defeated once (out of 20 games) only six weeks ago. My triumph is timeless. But that's as nothing in comparison to the satisfaction, I hope, to the delight Galen might get from the creation and making of such beautiful things.

Two other sets are entitled 'Wizard of Oz' and 'Gnomes'. The playfulness and whimsy of the art is wonderful and it's as hard not to chuckle when you reach out trying to move a piece even when it's only real in a picture. Personally, I admire the iconic stateliness of the 'Africa' set, but I'd die, more or less, to get my hands on the 'Egypt' set. The pharaohs and gods make me yearn to be a chess archeologist, digging up past games and treasures to defeat that accursed younger player whom --- have I mentioned this before? --- I beat once only six weeks ago. There is a great and enviable power in the invincible 'Egypt' pieces.

An extraordinary thing about Galen Sartore is the range of his talents. He's not only a brilliant chess set creator but also a writer and animator, as well as being a musician and filmmaker. And he's autistic. This by no means surprised me when I visited Galen and his mother at their home. One of my

closest friends is the former Director of The Victorian College of the Arts (VCA). She has observed to me several times that she thinks 40 to 50 per cent of the students, including the very best of the pack, are dyslexic and/or autistic. It's an art that gives them self-expression, identity and fulfilment.

Galen's own journey was not easy and I can only admire his resolute courage. His story demands to be told in a much longer form and must include his mother, Bette Sartore. She's an author who has written three books about disadvantaged young people, which Galen has illustrated. She's also a theatre-maker and fine jeweller whose work speaks of both determination and beauty. I'd say, "Good luck to you both," but I suspect 'luck' has had little to do with the grit, talent and imagination of their lives.

Nalderun Education Aboriginal Corporation- An overview

NALDERUN (Nalderun Education Aboriginal Corporation), meaning 'all together', is a local Aboriginal-run and led organisation and registered charity that predominantly focuses on providing opportunities for young, local First Nations People whilst also supporting their families. The organisation also provides historical and cultural learning opportunities to the extended community, instilling the values of Country, truth telling and Indigenous world views, having many partnerships in government, community, education and health. Connection to Country, Community and Culture is at the core of Nalderun's work - walking together for a thriving future for all.

Nalderun supports young First Peoples to navigate the education system into meaningful employment, growing strong, proud leaders. Employment within the organisation involves an innovative cyclic mentorship approach. While Elders have a key place as directors on the board, young First Nations people hold a strong voice in decision-making about Nalderun's programs.

The organisation relies heavily on grants and donations every year. Funding provides 20 part-time positions - 80% being Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. As an ally and volunteer, it is incredible to witness the impact of the work, the breadth of community support and engagement, and how much the broader community also benefits when Nalderun is supported.

Nalderun's work involves personalised student support, from tutoring to travel, and several programs including the following:

School Based Apprenticeship Program (SBAT) and wrap-around service.

Developing skills and connection in many areas including land

management, conservation, agriculture, horticulture, education, business management and machinery operations.

Warrarrak business

Connecting and engaging First Nations women and gender-diverse students from local high schools (predominantly CSC) in a range of activities which include day trips, camps and cultural days.

Kuli Business

A collaboration between Nalderun and Castlemaine Secondary College, guided by Uncle Rick Nelson, this program is for young Indigenous men. It involves trips on Country, and cultural engagement that includes hands-on activities and skill-building. It helps them build strong connections to their Indigenous peers, a positive growth mindset and supports ongoing engagement with education.

Youth Mentor Leadership Program

This program is led by First Nations Youth Mentors who regularly visit, build relationships with and support local First Nations high school students. They have hosted Cultural Days on Djaara Country as well as a two-day camp on Djab Wurrung Country.

The Meeting Place

Held fortnightly during school terms, based in Yapeen, this program is for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children within the Mount Alexander Shire and Maryborough Education Centre and sometimes beyond. Students come together to learn the curriculum through Culture and Country. All who attend are honoured in the spirit of community learning.

Foodshare

Nalderun delivered food to 13 families fortnightly through Foodshare last year in partnership with Bendigo Foodshare. A lot of meals!

Me- Mandook Galk

The community-supported acquisition of land has allowed a strong connection with Country and shared community vision. This is the home of Nalderun's new Bush Tucker Place, which is part of Nalderun's long-term vision to care for Country and Community. Nalderun has been strengthening the partnership with the mob at the Middleton prison, and community mentorship, being on a wonderful learning journey about native plants that the farm is starting to produce and hoping to propagate over the year. The dream is to establish a sound revenue stream going into the future.

Education Network Group

The group meets with local schools four times a year to support and help teachers with Indigenous pedagogy and worldviews and to incorporate Indigenous content into the curriculum through Aboriginal and Torres Islander protocols. Nalderun also runs tailored Indigenous worldview and pedagogy training for schools and local organisations.

Nalderun is breaking cycles of intergenerational trauma and disadvantage, which occur through ongoing colonisation. It is building pride, resilience and wellbeing.

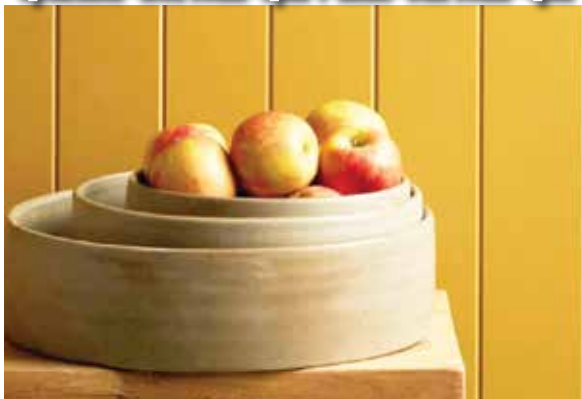

Holocaust Remembrance Day

Saturday 27 January was Holocaust Remembrance Day. Arnold Zable is a Melbourne author, storyteller and human rights activist. His parents came from Poland 'before the gates were closed'. Almost all his extended family, remaining in Poland, was wiped out in the Holocaust. They were killed in German extermination camps as part of the 'Final Solution'.

The theme for Holocaust Remembrance Day 2024 is 'Freedom is Fragile'. Book burning in Germany began in 1933, aimed at 'un-German spirit' and Jewish intellectualism. When Poland was occupied in 1939, Jewish access to libraries was banned. Removing access to books limits what people can learn and controls their thinking and their communications. It attempts to cancel their culture, history and heritage.

Books matter. The proverb 'the pen is mightier than the sword' suggests the power of the written word. We need to value books and access books through libraries, large and small. Freedom is fragile and vulnerable.

Snake Bite Advice

SNAKE season is well underway, and Ambulance Victoria is urging people across Loddon Mallee to be on the lookout and to know what to do if you or someone you're with gets bitten. Paramedics responded to a fatal suspected snake bite in the Mallee recently, demonstrating the increased risk across the region heading into summer.

There is a high danger of snakes at places like farms and campgrounds, and it's particularly important to know how to get help given bites may occur in a remote location. Most snakes in Victoria are venomous and a bite can be life-threatening. If someone is suspected to have suffered a snake bite, even if you're not sure, you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately. Snake bites may cause pain and swelling around the bite, or there may be very few signs left on the skin.

If a snake bite victim becomes unresponsive, you should begin CPR. If the patient is conscious, it is important to keep them still and reassured while waiting for help – only move them if it is too unsafe to stay put.

Snake bites commonly occur on hands, feet or limbs so applying a pressure immobilisation bandage around the affected areas from the top to the bottom of the limb can also make a big difference to the treatment and outcome of a snake bite incident.

People should not wash the site of the bite, as venom left on the skin can be used to help identify the type of snake and required anti-venom treatment. Symptoms that snake venom has entered the body may include dizziness, blurred vision, breathing difficulties, nausea, muscle weakness or paralysis.

- All snake bites should be considered a medical emergency
- Most (but not all) Victorian snakes are venomous
- Do not attempt to catch or kill a snake yourself
- Bite marks may not be obvious – seek help immediately and call Triple Zero (000) if you suspect you have been bitten

If you or someone you're with is bitten:

- DRSABC (Dangers? Responsive? Send for help. Open airway. Check for breathing. Start CPR if required)
- Call Triple Zero (000)
- Keep patient still and reassure them
- Apply a pressure immobilisation bandage
- Splint the limb to prevent movement
- Wait with the patient until help arrives

***Choice: Embrace the Possible* by Dr Edith Eger, 2017**

When the camp is finally liberated, she is pulled from a pile of bodies, barely alive.

The horrors of the Holocaust didn't break Edith. In fact, they helped her learn to live again with a life-affirming strength and a truly remarkable resilience. *The Choice* is her unforgettable story.

***Jewels and Ashes* by Arnold Zable, 1991**

In a memoir of a Jewish man's search for his roots, the son of Holocaust survivors returns to his parent's homeland in Poland to rediscover the former glory of East European Jewry.

***Shoah* by Claude Lanzmann, 2010 – 4 DVD set**

Shoah is Claude Lanzmann's landmark documentary meditation on the Holocaust. Assembled from footage shot by the filmmaker during the 1970s and 1980s, it investigates the genocide at the level of experience: The geographical layout of the camps and the ghettos; the daily routines of imprisonment; the inexorable trauma of humiliation, punishment and extermination; and the fascinating insights of those who experienced these events first hand. Absent from the film is any imagery shot at the time the Holocaust occurred. There is only Lanzmann and his crew, filming in private spaces and now-dormant zones of eradication to extract testimony from a series of survivors, witnesses, and oppressors alike. Through his relentless questioning (aided on occasion by a hidden camera), Lanzmann is able to coax out material of unparalleled emotional truth that constitutes both precious oral history and withering indictment.

***Schindler's List* by Steven Spielberg, 1993**

Schindler's List is a 1993 American epic historical drama film directed and produced by Steven Spielberg and written by Steven Zaillian. It is based on the 1982 novel *Schindler's Ark* by Australian novelist Thomas Keneally. The film follows Oskar Schindler, a German industrialist who saved more than a thousand mostly Polish-Jewish refugees from the Holocaust by employing them in his factories during World War II. It stars Liam Neeson as Schindler, Ralph Fiennes as SS officer Amon Göth, and Ben Kingsley as Schindler's Jewish accountant Itzhak Stern.

A quick scroll through recent posts on some of Maldon's social media sites has led this writer to the conclusion that it's time to make a few suggestions when it comes to social media use:

- Be nice, be kind. Ask yourself the question before you post a comment about someone: "Would I be happy if someone posted this comment about me?"
- Think twice about sharing comments or content that may be offensive.

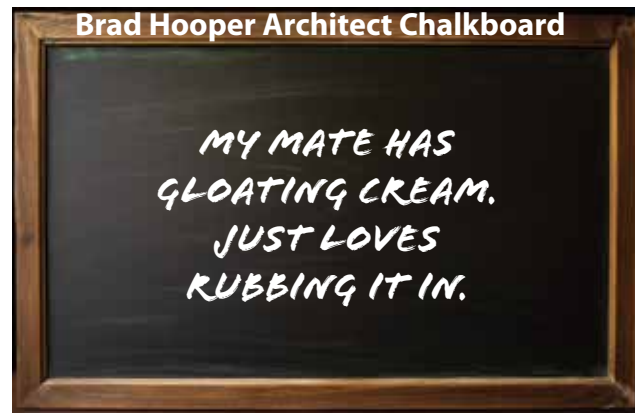

RCVC YouTube video



Team members of the Regional Community Vet Clinic work together to provide essential services for a pet in need.

If you haven't seen it yet, check out the Regional Community Vet Clinic's YouTube video released in November as part of their grant spotlight from the team at Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal www.youtube.com/watch?v=JIt_LnaEgLc

Robyn Slattery, one of the co-founders of Regional Community Vet Clinic (RCVC), and two other animal welfare enthusiasts, including a veterinarian, established a not-for-profit community veterinary clinic. This volunteer-run clinic aims to provide low-cost or free services to pet owners, ensuring that financial constraints don't sever the precious bond between them and their pets. This initiative helps prevent animal shelters from becoming overwhelmed with pets surrendered due to their owners' financial difficulties.

Understanding the profound companionship animals offer, RCVC believes that lack of funds shouldn't prevent people from experiencing the joy of pet ownership. They argue that

this is especially crucial since pets often serve as the only companions for the isolated or elderly, particularly during times of increased loneliness.

RCVC also offers an outreach service where volunteers assist pet owners with tasks they may find challenging, such as medicating pets or taking dogs for walks. The clinic's establishment involved extensive planning and was significantly aided by a crucial grant that served as a catalyst for its fruition. Despite the challenges of fundraising and facing rejections, Robyn emphasises the importance of persistence and never giving up on a good idea that benefits the community.

The presence of pets in our lives is invaluable, and RCVC's mission is to ensure that everyone, including the elderly and financially disadvantaged, can enjoy this relationship, reinforcing the idea that a true community is inclusive of all its members.

A WORD FROM YOUR LOCAL CHURCH

A Man of Principles

IT was my privilege recently to conduct a funeral for a man who was well-known in our wider community. His name was Richard Yates. Wyoming, USA-born and bred Richard was the wood artisan who created the statues of well-known locals in the community of Chewton. But he was also the man who stood in the streets of Maldon and Castlemaine sharing his Christian faith with anyone who would stop to chat.

One thing people may not have known is that Richard had survived leukaemia three times. Enduring an epic 18-year journey of major health challenges, Richard faced life as a shining light of creativity, positivity, kindness, patience, charity, and love. He spread joy and created friendships wherever he went. Richard shared his faith and love for God with everyone he met,

whether it was in the street or the hospital ward where he spent a lot of time in the last few years. A simple, “Howdy, how ya doin’? My name’s Richard, can I give you this?” and he would hand out a leaflet about what it means to be a follower of Jesus.

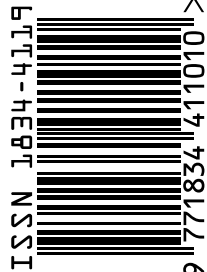
