Levy raises questions

A State Government levy to raise funds for emergency services has caused some concerns, with suggestions that there was not enough consultation and that the levy is an expanded tax.

The Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) was announced in December by the Victorian Government as a replacement for the Fire Services Property Levy and will be collected from Tuesday 1 July. The Government stated that the levy will provide funding for emergency services including VICSES, Triple Zero Victoria, the State Control Centre, Emergency Management Victoria, Emergency Recovery Victoria and Forest Fire Management Victoria, in addition to the CFA and Fire Rescue Victoria. Active CFA and VICSES volunteers and life members will be eligible for an exemption from paying the ESVF on their primary place of residence and the ESVF will be collected by councils and appear on rates notices.

Questions have been raised during last week's parliamentary question time and in press releases from the Nationals, who said that the levy created less transparency on where and how money is spent. The Nationals' Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad said: "The ESVF is an expanded tax which will be collected by local councils." She accused the government of scrambling to adequately fund vital emergency services through the ESVF. "This forces Victorian ratepayers to foot the bill for what should be core government services," Ms Broad said.

Meanwhile Rural Councils Victoria (representing 34 member councils across the state) stated that it is "...disappointed with both a lack of consultation and the changes themselves, which are unfair on rural councils and rural communities." RCV says it has written to state government ministers to seek clarity and about how the levy can be delivered fairly and equitably.

Caravan park: drop in, speak up



RESIDENTS interested in having a say about the future of Maldon Caravan Park should attend Mount Alexander Shire Council's community drop-in session tomorrow, Saturday 1 March between 8am and 11am at Bank Corner (the corner of Main and High Streets). It is just one of the ways that Council is consulting with locals about the issue.

The Council has explained that the choice of date and time was considered and by design: they wanted to be available during the Saturday morning coffee rush on a day when many will be in town for the Townwide Garage Sale.

Ed Butler, Manager Communications and Customer Services for Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC), said the council hoped to maximise opportunities to hear from more people. "This is a principle of best-practise community engagement and aligns with our project aim," he said.

The *Tarrangower Times* asked MASC why the future of the caravan park is under consideration at this time, and a spokesperson pointed to Frequently Asked Questions on a council information sheet. It stated: "We regularly undertake assessment and review of our assets to ensure they remain relevant and are fit for purpose. Community consultation is part of this process." Other answers to FAQs can be found on the Shape Mount Alexander web page about the caravan park: **tinyurl.com/ysbyjadt**.

Council is assuring those who are unable to attend a dropin session that they can make their opinions known in other ways. "We understand that some people in the community are disappointed they will be unable to attend the informal drop-in session due to hosting a garage sale, and we have made alternative arrangements," the spokesperson said. Those options include completing the survey on the Shape Mount Alexander website, emailing feedback to **info@mountalexander.vic.gov. au**, calling 5471 1700 or obtaining a hard copy survey from Maldon Visitor Information Session, Maldon Neighbourhood Centre, and the Maldon Athenaeum Library.

MASC says the project has already had a large number of contributions and it is looking forward to receiving many more over the coming weeks. Consultation closes on Monday 10 March.

Council policies reviewed at first meeting

It is standard for a Complaints Policy to be reviewed and updated upon commencement of a new Council; this review took place with the assistance of the Victorian Ombudsman (it does not apply to the Councillors or the Chief Executive Officer). The key change adopted, at the request of Council's Audit and Risk Committee, is that the Complaints Policy now includes a specific section on how contractor complaints are managed.

Privacy and Data Protection Policy 2025

This Policy provides guidance for Council's management of personal information as required under the Victorian Privacy and Data Protection Act and the Health Records Act. The Policy had been adopted in 2019 and not been formally reviewed since. This review was designed to update the Policy which states that Mount Alexander Shire Council is committed to

Fire report

THE fire season is drawing to a close; it has been such a pleasure to talk to the dedicated leaders at our local Fire Brigades each week: they always have a spare moment and are happy to share their considerable knowledge. Thanks for your time, Brendan, Bruce and Doug.

Baringhup

Captain of Baringhup Fire Brigade Brendan McKnight reported a call to Hamiltons Crossing on Sunday 23 February that was thankfully smaller than expected; it was first reported as a crowd with a large bonfire. "Somebody was cooking tea on a total ban. It was an open fire in a constructed fireplace," he said, describing a small group of young people who were apologetic and remorseful. But still, as Brendan said: "No flames on a total fire ban!" It's a great reminder to keep an eye on the forecast. "You've just got to know where you are and what the rules are." the protection of an individual's privacy; it sets out how this will be achieved across council's various activities. There is no requirement under the Local Government Act 2020 to undergo Community engagement or consultation for the Privacy and Data Protection Policy.

Gift policy 2025

The Councillor Gift Policy, including procedures for the maintenance of a Gift Register, was created in 2021 and this review ensures it remains current; no significant changes were made. The Policy states Council's position to offers of gifts, which is that gifts should generally not be accepted, with the overriding principle that no gift that is accepted shall provide the donor with a favourable benefit or advantage. Gifts that are offered must be recorded in Council's Gift Register.

While the legislation only requires adoption of a Gift Policy in relation to Councillors, the policy was drafted to support both Councillors and employees of the Mount Alexander Shire Council to avoid conflicts of interest and to maintain high levels of integrity and public trust.

A summary of the Gift Register, plus the Personal Interest Returns for Councillors and nominated Officers (to avoid conflicts of interest), is included on Council's website and includes information on offers made in the current Council term.

Avian influenza detected at third property

Agriculture Victoria has confirmed H7N8 high pathogenicity avian influenza (bird flu) on a third poultry farm in Euroa. This new detection is in close proximity to the two other infected properties.

Victoria's Acting Chief Veterinary Officer Dr Cameron Bell said given the close proximity of these properties, this new detection is not unexpected, and that Agriculture Victoria staff are on the ground working closely with industry to contain and eradicate the virus.

With the confirmation of H7N8 on a third property, a housing requirement remains in place for properties with 50 or more poultry in the restricted area. This includes Euroa and extends approximately five kilometres from the affected properties in all directions.

To reduce the risk of further disease, birds on these properties must be kept in cages or sheds to avoid contact with other birds. This is a proven method to minimise direct contact between poultry and wild birds. Community members must report suspect disease and sudden poultry death by calling the VicEmergency Hotline on 1800 226 226.

Dr Bell thanked the impacted properties for their cooperation and reassured Victorians that supermarket eggs and poultry products remain safe to consume. Bendigo's Indian Association receives grant



The Indian Association of Bendigo (IAB) will receive significant funding under the Federal Government's Multicultural Grassroots Initiatives, supporting cultural and intercultural activities such as a sports program focussed on swimming and aquatic safety, community service projects, cultural exchange days and discussion groups that promote stronger bonds among community members and increase connection and collaboration.

Secretary of IAB Ajay Mishra said: "This program further encourages individuals from diverse demographics to engage, participate, and demonstrate to all community members that Greater Bendigo is a place where multicultural communities can safely connect with their cultural and religious identities."

Snapshot of rural Australia paints grim picture

The Rural Health in Australia Snapshot 2025 paints a grim picture of health inequities between rural and metropolitan areas. National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA) states that rural, regional and remote Australians are dving at higher rates than their urban counterparts, with avoidable deaths in the regions nearly four times higher. According to the NRHA, nearly 18,500 people in Australia still have no access to essential primary healthcare services within an hour's drive of their home. The Snapshot compiles essential data on health risks, outcomes, disease burden, healthcare workforce, domestic violence, maternity health and funding disparities - revealing how far rural areas lag behind their metropolitan counterparts.

"This data highlights the shameful failure to adequately provide funding and services to rural Australians, who contribute so much to our economy. Why are they treated like second-class citizens, with a staggering \$848 less spent per person per year on healthcare?" said NRHA Chief Executive Susi Tegen.

The NRHA says that as interest in rural living grows, it is essential to ensure that people are supported by adequate infrastructure, including accessible healthcare, to maintain a fulfilling and holistic lifestyle.

"The Snapshot reinforces the urgent need for immediate action, especially with the Federal election on the horizon. It is a wake-up call to say enough is enough. For decades, we have known about the healthcare challenges, the additional costs, and the tyranny of distance, but there has been too little action," Ms Tegen says.

The National Rural Health Alliance (the Alliance) comprises 52 national organisations committed to improving the health and wellbeing of the over 7 million people in rural and remote Australia.

Review of voluntary assisted dying

The State Government has accepted all recommendations from the independent review into Australia's first voluntary assisted dying (VAD) laws and will make further reforms to make them fairer. Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas tabled in Parliament on Thursday 20 February the review into the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2017, which has given Victorians with a life limiting illness, dignified and compassionate choices since 2019.

The review found there was strong community support for VAD, with the service often accessed at the same time as palliative care. It also found that it is operating safely – with no reports of ineligible people gaining access to VAD.

Despite this, the review found areas for improvement including further guidance for health practitioners on how to deal with patients that want to access VAD.

It also found that the Victorian Government needs to continue to advocate to the Commonwealth Government for greater support to ensure VAD remains accessible, viable and sustainable into the future.

In response to this important review, feedback from the community and the recommendations made by the Voluntary Assisted Dying Review Board, the Government plans to rewrite legislation to improve access to VAD, bringing it in line with other jurisdictions.

Since 2019, 1,282 Victorians have accessed VAD services as a safe and dignified end of life choice.

Free IT degrees for women and gender diverse people

RMIT's free Diploma of Information Technology for women and gender diverse students across Victoria will continue in 2025, supported by the federal government.

The part-time, online course provides students in paid employment in any industry the opportunity to upskill in the high-demand field of IT. It is open to women and gender diverse people across regional Victoria and Melbourne. Applications are now open for the 2025 intake. To apply, prospective students can contact **ve.partnerships@rmit.edu.au**. Applications are open now and will close once spots are filled.

Extreme weather: crop research

A world first facility researching the impact of extreme hot and cold weather on crops is expanding. The FATE facility measures the impact of heat waves, drought and frost on cereal, pulse and oilseed crops, testing conditions on the crops at various stages to understand the impact on grain quality. This expansion will enable more crop rotations and experiments, accelerating the development of new heat tolerant crop varieties for farmers. The equipment can be used for future research on other crops, including different grazing pasture species.

Respite funding for carers services

The State Government has opened applications for the Additional Respite for Carers Program 2025-27 and is encouraging organisations such as carer support groups, peak bodies, health services, councils and neighbourhood houses to apply for the funding – particularly if they are delivering innovative services that support rural and regional Victorians, those from diverse backgrounds and First Nations carers.

Eligible groups can apply for between \$30,000 to \$1 million per year over two years to enable unpaid carers to take time away, addressing the critical need for accessible respite supporting carers from all ages, backgrounds and circumstances.

Business advocate addresses COUNCILLOR'S COLUMN Council

MALDON'S Luz Restrepo addressed the meeting of Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) last week, asking how it will fulfil its own economic development plans in relation to local small businesses. Luz, who runs the organisations Migrant Women in Business and Made by Many Minds (and has recently coordinated small business expos in Maldon) told council that she believes there is a disconnect between community leaders and businesses.

Pointing to the 2021-2025 Council Plan, which includes objectives around building a resilient and growing local economy and efficient, sustainable businesses, Luz asked what progress has been made and what tangible actions will be taken.

A number of Councillors responded to the queries. Councillor Toby Heydon noted that 62% of the economy is made up of sole traders and that 27% of businesses have fewer than four employees. He highlighted the Careers Fair in Castlemaine on Wednesday 19 February as an example of Council's work with small and micro-businesses.

Councillor Matthew Driscoll noted that Council's Economic Development Coordinator is actively engaged with businesses and the



farming community, adding that Council supports businesses through a range of initiatives, including the prioritisation of local procurement and investing in local infrastructure. Councillor Driscoll also referred to the 200 businesses supported by Workspace, a business incubator based in Castlemaine.

Councillor Rosie Annear spoke about future opportunities to engage with Council including the upcoming Budget, Council Plan, Municipal Health and Wellbeing Plan as well as a midterm review of the Community Vision.

Council members generally indicated that they are open to further dialogue with the wider business community.

Chicken compliance: council comments

CENTRAL Goldfields Shire Council (CGSC) says it is working with the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) in relation to existing broiler farms and compliance with relevant conditions and guidelines, but future planning decisions will not be affected.

The Tarrangower Times contacted the Council after at least two instances of spontaneous combustion allegedly occurred in stockpiles of spent chicken litter in recent weeks (see the TT Friday 21 February and Friday 17 January). CGSC indicated that it is monitoring broiler farms in the shire and a spokesperson said: "Council is partnering with the EPA with regard to issues of compliance, some of which lie with either the EPA, Council or both organisations."

The *TT* asked whether the council would consider the operations of the existing farms, where relevant, when making a decision about proposals for future farms. "Whether valid or not, Council cannot consider issues of compliance pertaining to (an) existing permit in the assessment of any new permit," the spokesperson said. "All new permit applications are assessed on their merits as a stand alone development proposal. The regulatory requirements for any proposal are assessed using the latest standards."

CGSC said that decisions about the advertised planning applications for new broiler farms will take place in the coming months. "Council is now prioritising the completion of the assessment of the three applications and determining a timeline to bring the matters forward for a decision. This is anticipated to be concluded by the end of the financial year," they said.

CGSC won't comment on the assessment of the applications until after a decision is made.







New Developments in AI



Australian researchers are designing a global real-time monitoring system to help save the world's coral reefs from further decline, primarily due to bleaching caused by global warming.

A collaborative project led by the University of South Australia (UniSA), with input from Queensland and Victorian researchers, is integrating remote sensing technologies with machine learning, artificial intelligence and Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to monitor and hopefully stall the damage to the world's most fragile marine ecosystems. A multimodal platform will distil all research data relating to coral reefs, including underwater videos and photographs, satellite

images, text files and time-sensor readings, onto a central dashboard for real-time global monitoring. "By centralising all this data in real time, we can generate predictive models that will help conservation efforts, enabling earlier intervention," according to Central Queensland University PhD candidate Musfera Jahan, a GIS data expert.

Meanwhile CSIRO Australia's national science agency, has developed an advanced artificial intelligence (AI) tool for assisting in the estimation of biological sex from human skulls. The AI tool has the potential to accelerate the accurate identification of skulls, supporting investigators when results are needed rapidly, for example, in criminal analysis and severe natural disasters.

Results published in Scientific Reports show the AI tool achieved an accuracy of 97 per cent, significantly outperforming the 82 per cent accuracy achieved by conventional methods used by human assessors. The tool was developed in collaboration with The University of Western Australia (UWA), whose forensic anthropology experts provided labelled data and domain knowledge to support model development.

CSIRO research scientist and joint first-author of the study, Dr Hollie Min, said imaging from a dataset of 200 computerised tomography - or CT scans - was analysed for sex-associated traits by the AI algorithm, with results then compared against human analysis "Our AI tool produces its results approximately five times faster than humans can, meaning families waiting for results of investigations can receive news about their loved ones more quickly," Dr Min said.

Natural Newstead

Where are you?

In recent weeks I've made regular visits to the area around South German Track, one of the more reliable spots in the district for woodland birds. It is one place where, until recently, I could count on recording the elusive **Crested Bellbird**.

Heard rather than seen, my last observation was in early spring last year. Not a single sign since!

While Crested Bellbirds are generally quiet over summer, they do still call, and I worry that we might be witnessing a local extinction. At best there have been two pairs in this patch of bush in recent times. The photos are a selection of sightings from late January, including a bronze-cuckoo that left me puzzled

The Why of the *Tarrangower Times*

NUMEROUS recent prompts have inspired ponderings about the media, its role and its changing nature. On the one hand, mass media has become centrally controlled in a way that was once considered treacherous, while at the same time, everyone with access to social media has their own personal platform. Truth was always a malleable concept but now it is optional. Critical thinking has had to become more critical and as Abraham Lincoln famously said: "Don't believe everything you read on the internet." As more and more printed newspapers across the country fold (pun sadly noted), it is a good time to consider why the *TT* presses on (there's another).

The purpose of the paper

With all this in mind, what is the purpose of the Tarrangower Times? The people who make this hyper-local, community-focused publication think and talk about this often: the answer evolves. The *TT* attempts to keep residents in the loop about activities, emergencies, disruptions, changes and announcements, naturally; but surely the mode of delivery amounts to something. You could find these pieces of information online but the TT gathers it all in a central place and — hopefully speaks to you with a local's perspective and understanding. The *TT* tries to answer your questions before you ask them; it aims for a positive and socially cohesive angle (in contrast to some online platforms that shall remain un-named) and endeavours to create a space for healthy conversations instead of argy-bargy. There's also room for content that is simply fun, interesting or joyous. Plus, you can read it over a cuppa, IRL (In Real Life), together.

Great responsibility

The are many things that the TT chooses not to print including rumours, unfounded allegations and stories featuring people just having a bad day. The TT strives towards measured, balanced, reliable reporting. The paper is under-resourced but still aims to check multiple sources as appropriate and provide direct quotes. (By the way, if the TT quotes someone it doesn't mean that person is correct or that the TT agrees).

Research from Charles Darwin University (interestingly, using AI tools) shows that some proliferating extremist views and distrust are caused or reinforced by "fabricated stories, cherry-picked evidence, and inflammatory language." The studies show how fear-based language and a spotlight on identity can drive division. The *TT's* approach of seeking multiple views and encouraging engagement is intended to counter these issues.

As for bias in reporting, it's difficult to avoid when humans are involved and it's important to acknowledge this. The TTchooses what to include and how to present with the aim to include information that it thinks is of interest and value to readers. Thus, values sometimes align (the TT and its contributors are members of this community too) but not always. In most cases within the paper's reportage, the voice and opinions of writers are not featured; situations or sources are let to speak for themselves. If you don't like it, write a Letter to the Editor!

Place-based press

The local nature of the TT is surely its biggest strength and it makes our community a better place to live: 'Keeping up with the locals' is not just a catchy tagline. TT stories are for and about its readers and community interactions help to drive the paper's content each week. The TT also appreciates community members, groups and businesses who understand

that their financial contributions, including regular purchases of the paper, help to maintain the quality and continued existence of the *Tarrangower Times*. However, the *TT* remains proudly independent.

The truth isn't out there

Sorry Mulder, but there often isn't just one 'truth' and it certainly won't be handed to anyone in an X-file. That doesn't mean that the TT will be offering 'alternative facts' or running 'fake news', but it does mean that there are multiple sides to any story.

There is a fantastic proverb shared broadly online that is credited to the Japanese: "If you believe everything you read, better not read," but a credible source could not be found, so don't take any notice of it. Instead readers are assured that the *TT* is committed to striving and improving or as the Japanese say: "七転び八起き".




upholstery, but you wouldn't call it a restoration, just maintenance, keeping in mind that 1974 is 50 years ago now.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Bob Hawke in Maldon



ON Thursday 12 March 1987, Prime Minister Bob Hawke visited Maldon as part of his tour of Central Victoria promoting tourism and the 'Australian Made' campaign. His purpose in coming to Maldon was to inspect progress on restoring the Castlemaine to Maldon railway as a tourist attraction and to present funding for the project. When he arrived by car at the Railway Station, several hundred locals were there to meet him.

Soon after he arrived, the Prime Minister boarded the train drawn by the K160 steam engine for the short trip along the reconstructed line just as far as the Bendigo Road. About 120 pupils from the Maldon Primary School joined him on board. On the return back to the station, Hawke took control of the train and, with obvious glee, brought it safely home.

At the end of the trip, Hawke said that it had taken him back to his youth when he had travelled by steam train in Western Australia and across the Nullarbor to the East. Student reporters from the Primary School's newspaper, the *School Post*, then interviewed and photographed him. After they finished questioning him, Hawke complimented the students, saying they could teach the Canberra press gallery a lot about good manners.

Before he left Maldon, the Prime Minister presented Shire President Jock Comini with a cheque representing the first instalment of a \$152,000 Community Employment Program grant to help restore the railway line between Maldon and Castlemaine. The grant would fund 14 positions of which five were to be women. Comini then presented Hawke with a cheese dish made by Neville Wilson at Maldon Pottery.

Hawke was only the second Prime Minister to make an official visit to Maldon. The first was Prime Minister Billy Hughes, who held an election meeting at Calder's timber yard in April 1917 during his campaign to become the Federal member for Bendigo.

At the time of Hawke's visit, the major obstacle to completing the railway was the condition of the timber bridge over the Muckleford Creek. Following his visit, it was arranged for Army units to reconstruct the bridge. In October 1989 the 91st Forestry Squadron, known as the Woodpeckers, milled structural timbers for the bridge at their Puckapunyal sawmill. In late February 1990, 20 men from the 21st Construction Squadron, led by Lieutenant Kevin Earle, set up camp at Muckleford and dismantled the old structure. Within two months they had rebuilt the bridge and on 19 May the Railway Preservation Society held a 'thank you' trip to Muckleford for the soldiers who had worked on the bridge and their families.

World Wildlife Day 3 March and World Book Day 7 March



Library reviews

Table for Two by Amor Towles, 2024 The millions of readers of Amor Towles are in for a treat as he shares some of his short stories set in New York City and a novella in Los Angeles. The New York stories, most of which are set around the turn of the millennium, take up everything from the death-defying acrobatics of the male ego, to the fateful consequences of brief encounters, and the delicate mechanics of compromise which operate at the heart of modern marriages. In Towles's novella, Rules of Civility, the indomitable Evelyn Ross leaves New York City in September 1938 with the intention of returning home to Indiana. But as her train pulls into Chicago, where her parents are waiting, she instead extends her ticket to Los Angeles. Told from seven points of view, Eve in Hollywood describes how Eve crafts a new future for herself and others in the midst of Hollywood's golden age.

Maggie Smith: A Biography by Michael Coveney, 2015

No one does glamour, severity, girlish charm or tightlipped witticism better than Dame Maggie Smith. Michael Coveney's biography shines a light on the life and career of a truly remarkable performer, one whose stage and screen career spans six decades. From her days as a West End star of comedy and revue, Dame Maggie's path would cross with those of the greatest actors, playwrights and directors of the era. Her film and television career has been just as starry. From the title character in The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie and the meddling chaperone in A Room With a View to the Harry Potter films and the Best Exotic Marigold Hotel, Smith has thrilled, engaged and made audiences laugh. Paradoxically she remains an enigmatic figure, rarely appearing in public. Michael Coveney's absorbing biography, written with the actress's blessing and drawing on personal archives, as well as interviews with immediate family and close friends, is a portrait of one of the greatest actors of our time.

The Vanishing Point by Val McDermid, 2012

Young Jimmy Higgins is snatched from an airport security checkpoint while his guardian watches helplessly from the glass inspection box. But this is no ordinary abduction, as Jimmy is no ordinary child. His mother was Scarlett, a reality TV star who, dying of cancer and alienated from her unreliable family, entrusted the boy to the person she believed best able to give him a happy, stable life: her ghost writer, Stephanie Harker. Assisting the FBI in their attempt to recover the missing boy, Stephanie reaches into the past to uncover the motive for the abduction. Has Jimmy been taken by his own relatives? Is Stephanie's obsessive ex-lover trying to teach her a lesson? Has one of Scarlett's stalkers come back to haunt them all?

State of Wonder by Ann Patchett, 2011

In a narrative replete with poison arrows, devouring snakes, scientific miracles, and spiritual transformations, State of Wonder presents a world of stunning surprise and danger, rich in emotional resonance and moral complexity.

As Dr. Marina Singh embarks upon an uncertain odyssey into the insect-infested Amazon, she will be forced to surrender herself to the lush but forbidding world that awaits within the jungle. Charged with finding her former mentor Dr. Annick Swenson, a researcher who has disappeared while working on a valuable new drug, she will have to confront her own memories of tragedy and sacrifice as she journeys into the unforgiving heart of darkness.


Is there a tennis player you admire and why?
