Owner Rebecca Barnett says the Baker as a symbol for the business was inspired by the logo of her grandfather's bakery in South Australia. Now bakery fans can have a laugh by putting their face in the loaf, as shown by Alannah Bell.

Big step towards World Heritage list

A throng of political and media representatives converged beside the poppet head of the Central Deborah Mine in Bendigo on Friday 31 January for the announcement of a significant development in the Goldfields region's bid for World Heritage Listing. Federal Minister for the Environment and Water the Hon Tanya Plibersek joined Premier of Victoria and Member for Bendigo East Jacinta Allan and local leaders to confirm the Australian Government has given its approval for the nomination by adding the bid to its World Heritage 'Tentative List'.

The announcement effectively means that the federal government has rubber-stamped the nomination so that it can progress to the next stage of consideration by the international assessors. In making the announcement, Minister Plibersek said the region represented both hardships and successes. "The Victorian Goldfields tell so many stories. Of waves of immigration. Of building beautiful towns from a harsh landscape, that have stood the test of time. Of the local First Nations people who cared for and tended the land for tens of thousands of years. It is the most extensive, coherent and best-surviving gold-rush landscape in the world," she said. The Premier talked about a "special continuous connection" between the past and the present in the Goldfields region. "There is the unique natural environment and you can see the cultural markers of the Dja Dja Wurrung Traditional Owners," she said. Regarding gold mining, Ms Allan said: "You can see the physical presence right across the goldfields."

Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP said it was an opportunity to reveal the stories behind the landscapes and talked about the historical events in the region that led to democracy in Victoria.

Background of the bid

The bid for the Victorian Goldfields to join wonders such as Cambodia's Angkor, the Acropolis in Athens and Stonehenge on the list of World Heritage sites has been gradually evolving for decades. In the past few years, the bid has seen bi-partisan support, multi-level government cooperation, plus partnership between 15 local government areas and Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation. Recently the Maldon Museum and Historic Archives held an information display, while a community information session was held in Maldon in November as part of the World Heritage Bid Roadshow. Maldon contributes to the bid as one of the best surviving examples of a historic goldrush township in Victoria.

Six key areas in the Goldfields region have been included in the Tentative List submission, with the possibility of more areas being added as the nomination is developed. They include: • Bendigo Historic Urban Landscape

- Castlemaine Goldfields and Historic Townships
- Creswick and the Deep Lead Landscape
- Great Nuggets Historic Landscape (Tarnagulla, Moliagul, and Dunolly)
- Lalgambuk (Mt Franklin)
- Walhalla Alpine Mining Landscape

Australia already has some remarkable properties on the World Heritage list, including the Budj Bim Cultural Landscape, Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park and the Sydney Opera House.

What World Heritage listing means

The World Heritage List is currently made up of 1,223 places that have outstanding universal value, according to the World Heritage Committee of UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization). The list is prestigious and offers tourism marketing leverage. Minister Plibersek said: "World Heritage sites top the 'bucket lists' when it comes to attracting visitors." Premier Allan said of the Victorian Goldfields: "We all know it's beautiful and unique; now we have the opportunity to show the world."

Readiness Questioned

While the prospect of increased tourism numbers to the region was described during the announcement as positive, particularly for local businesses and attractions, questions were raised about the ability of infrastructure to cope. Minister Plibersek assured journalists that the government is working on issues of mobile phone coverage in some more remote areas. Federal Member for Bendigo Lisa Chesters, when asked about the state of roads between areas included in the submission, said that a round of Black Spot funding is currently underway and encouraged people to nominate areas of concern to their local MP.

Opportunity to invest in heritage

Premier Allan said that the application process from here will take a year or two and that provides plenty of time to become ready. "That gives us a great period to plan ahead," she said, adding that the State Government is "...always looking at ways to invest in our assets in Central Victoria." Hopefully then, as the bid for World Heritage listing progresses, some of the historic and heritage sites in Maldon that need attention will attract the funding required for them to remain world class sites.

Fire report



THE local CFA teams are incredible: knowledgeable, brave and hardworking. The community is so fortunate to have them on standby during this period of extended hot weather, which is expected to continue for at least the next week.

There have been a few call-outs recently. Newstead Fire Brigade was called to assist with a fire in Joyce's Creek on Thursday 30 January; it was a large hay stack fire involving a

shed and truck that seems to have spontaneously combusted. The Maldon team attended a shed fire in Harker Street, Maldon on Sunday 2 February. Maldon 1st Lieutenant (Acting Captain) Bruce Clements told the *TT*: "It appeared to be an electrical fault in a shed in the back of the property," and said

that thankfully, there was not a lot of damage. On Monday 3 February, teams from Campbells Creek, Castlemaine, Walmer, Maldon and Newstead attended a grass fire in Muckleford that seemed to have been ignited by mowing equipment. The *TT* happened to observe the admirably quick actions of the crews chasing the flames, which Bruce described as two or three times the height of the fuel. "It was quite lucky, there was no wind really pushing it along and the road was a natural fire break. It burnt about 3 acres, just grass, with no damage to infrastructure." Bruce said that in hot weather, people using machinery should have a reasonable sized extinguisher on hand and be sure it is adequate. He said it was a reminder: "Be mindful of the conditions."

In other brigade news, Tanker One from Maldon has been sent to the Grampians where the fire front is still very active, with many strike teams and personnel in attendance.

The rainfall during Sunday's huge storm brought some welcome relief, but there were many lightening strikes. Bruce explained that the outcome of this will become evident in the coming days. "There could be trees that are smouldering that could ignite later when it heats up again."

Fire Ready Reminders

- Make sure roadside numbers are visible, vegetation around gates, culverts and bridges has been cleared, and gates are wide enough and easy to open.

- With temperatures high over the coming days, what is your trigger to leave? Check the Fire Danger Rating and speak with your family and neighbours to determine when you will leave.
- Having an Emergency Kit ready to go will make it easy to leave and protect yourself and your loved ones. Your Emergency Kit should contain essential items - like important documents, water, a mobile phone and charger, medicines, pet food and a change of clothes.

Follow official warnings and advice using the VicEmergency app, the VicEmergency hotline (1800 226 226) and your local ABC emergency broadcaster. Never rely on one source of information.

Tomato brown rugose fruit virus in Victoria



Agriculture Victoria has this week issued a biosecurity alert with the recent detection of highly contagious tomato brown rugose fruit virus (ToBRFV) in Victoria. The virus affects tomato, capsicum and chilli plants and is a National Priority Plant Pest which poses a serious biosecurity risk to the vegetable industry in Australia. Symptoms of ToBRFV in fruits include chlorotic (yellow) spotting and marbling of fruits, deformation and uneven ripening and brown rugose (wrinkled) patches. Symptoms of ToBRFV in leaves include chlorosis (yellowing), Mosaic pattern and mottling on younger leaves, crumpling and deformation and blister-like appearance on the top surface of leaves. Producers and home gardeners are encouraged to monitor their relevant crops and to contact Agriculture Victoria if they suspect the disease might be present. Celebrating Victorian women in agriculture

Leaders from across the state gathered for the 64th Annual Pioneer Women's Ceremony in Melbourne on Sunday 3 February, celebrating Victorian Women's role in Agriculture.

The event marks 30 years since the Australian Bureau of Statistics recognised that women could list their occupation as farmer in the Census. Representatives from industry, peak agriculture bodies and gender equality organisations came together to celebrate the impact and influence Victorian women have on the agriculture sector and their communities. Guests heard from primary producer and Central Goldfields Shire councillor Liesbeth Long, Victorian Director of Australian Women in Agriculture Narelle Hanrahan and Australian Women in Agriculture founding member Alana Johnson AM, who spoke about the Invisible Farmer Project - the largest ever study of women on the land. Retirees could be over-paying Tax

The Super Members Council (SMC) says thousands of retirees are paying more tax than necessary because they haven't received basic advice to switch their super into the taxfree retirement phase. The SMC found that around 700,000 Australians over 65 who aren't working full-time still have an accumulation (savings-phase) account. This means retirees could be paying an extra \$650 in taxes each year on average.

If someone keeps \$100,000 in an accumulation account instead of moving it to a pension account, they could pay up to an extra \$4,500 in super taxes over their retirement. For \$200,000 balances, the extra tax could be \$9,000.

Some inactive accounts belong to people who are still working and adding to other accounts or keeping an accumulation account as a backup. However, research shows many people don't act because they are disengaged or don't know what to do. A consumer survey of retirees found about six in 10 Australians with lower balance (less than \$100,000) who have an inactive account keep it because they haven't decided what to do with super yet or don't know what to do with their account. Only 17% of Australians - and just 26% of current retirees - say they have sought financial advice from their super fund. Research shows four in five Australians aged 45-54 need financial advice but cannot afford it.

The Australian Government announced further details of its Delivering Better Financial Outcomes package but is yet to be legislated. The SMC says the reform would allow super funds to better guide members at key life stages with personalised prompts to support them for retirement. It would also create a new type of adviser who can give simple but quality advice on APRA-regulated products.

Study uncovers genetic key to weed invasion

Monash University researchers have made a breakthrough discovery about the invasion success of plants, with the revelation that large-scale genetic changes are the common ragweed's secret to rapidly adapt to new environments. The research discovered 37 largescale genetic changes, including 'supergenes', that have enabled the noxious weed to rapidly invade diverse environments worldwide. Super-genes are clusters of mutations that have a strong chance of being passed down through successive generations because they are inherited as a unit, as opposed to normal mutations which are inherited individually. They can maintain favourable trait combinations, giving invasive species an evolutionary edge to survive and thrive in a wide range of environments.

Monash School of Biological Sciences Associate Professor Kathryn Hodgins said: "Structural variants, particularly these supergenes, allow plants like ragweed to keep crucial genetic combinations intact as they spread to new regions," Associate Professor Hodgins said.

"This genetic toolkit helps them adapt rapidly and repeatedly – a phenomenon that is not only fascinating scientifically but also critical to understanding how to manage invasive species."

Ragweed's ability to rapidly adapt has significant implications for public health and agriculture. As a leading cause of hay fever and major agricultural weed, its spread presents challenges that demand innovative management strategies. The Monash researchers said that understanding the genetic mechanisms behind ragweed's rapid adaptation can inform efforts to control its spread.

Partnership between railway and disaster team

A new partnership between Victorian Goldfields Railway (VGR) and the Victorian Disaster Recovery Relief Team (DRRT) will provide benefits to both organisations while bringing new visitors to Maldon town and surrounds. The two groups worked together for the first time over the weekend of Friday 31 January to Sunday 2 February, as around 30 volunteers undertook Operational Skills Training at Muckleford Station.

Disaster Relieve Australia (DRA) works to unite the expertise and experience of military veterans, emergency responders and motivated civilians to deploy Disaster Relief Teams around Australia and the world. The Victorian wing currently has over 400 volunteers and this new partnership will provide opportunities for them to practise their emergency-response skills and strategies in the real world.

VGR volunteer Steve Strangward explained that the arrangement is mutually beneficial. "They will help manage the railway corridor, leading to safer operation of our trains," he said. "For example, this weekend was focused on improving sightline visibility at the Walmer Rd unprotected level crossing, so that the trains can see the cars and the cars can see the trains." In return the VGR offers its space and facilities. "The benefit to their organisation is that they have a large stable training ground where they can set up a base and train their people in a pseudo-real environment," Steve said.

DRA Training Coordinator Shane Canfield said: "It's a win-win partnership, and we're thrilled to have strengthened our ties with the community. We're already looking forward to many more training sessions at Muckleford."

Similar training exercises will take place monthly throughout the year, providing DRRT Victoria volunteers the chance to brush up on their skills in case of a large-scale emergency. The arrangement is a great way to offer assurance to the broader community that experts will be prepared and ready to assist in any future disaster that might occur.

Water report

Unlicensed water pumpers warned

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) is warning people against illegally pumping water from storages and waterways following a spate of incidents in recent weeks. As the weather has become warmer and drier, there have been several cases of people parking at boat ramps or besides waterways on public roads and pumping water into their trailer tanks. GMW Water Delivery Services General Manager Warren Blyth said people caught doing this would face legal action.

"Water is a valuable and limited resource. To ensure fairness in how it is used, we take a zero-tolerance approach to any form of unauthorised take." People who are caught pumping water from a GMW storage or waterway without the appropriate authorisations can be prosecuted for water theft under the Water Act 1989.

Mr Blyth said those in need of water, but lacking entitlements could contact GMW to discuss their options. Those wanting to discuss their options for sourcing water can phone GMW on 1800 013 357. People can use the same number to report any instances of water theft or send an email to **compliance@gmwater.com.au**.

Water corporations request respect

Rural water corporations across Victoria have united in standing against workplace aggression. The water corporations have staff in various roles who interact with customers, from those out in the field conducting maintenance on water delivery assets or doing meter reads, to those in the contact centres helping answer customers' queries. They said staff were there to assist customers and had the right to a safe workspace. "We understand some customers are currently in stressful situations due to the dry weather, but threats and abuse are never acceptable."

Rural water corporation staff occasionally have to conduct out of hours maintenance on certain assets, such as meters and flume gates. These assets are often on private property and while the water corporation will always try to notify landholders in advance, contacting them may not always be possible. Staff will always wear uniforms and have identification on them. "We expect our staff to always treat customers and each other with courtesy and respect, and in return we ask that customers treat our staff in the same way," the water corporations said.



Wiring fault sparks concern

A local family received a fright during the early hours of Tuesday 28 February when they noticed unusual buzzing sounds outside their open window. Maldon residents Sam and Alex had noticed that their lights had been flickering in the days prior and presumed it was a supply issue, but the puzzling buzz in the middle of the night created anxiety.

Sam told the *TT* that the sound was similar to that of an arc welder. "My wife Alex woke up, it was making a noise and she decided to investigate," he said. "She saw sparking out the window; the connection is just outside the window." Alex expressed relief that the window had been open on a hot night, saying she would not have heard it otherwise. Sam described the power lines that lead to what he referred to as a 'junction box' on the house and said that the sound and sparks came from the box. They followed it up with the power company immediately. "On the electricity bill there's a number for faults," Sam said. "I called and it was picked up straight away."

A spokesperson from Powercor confirmed that they had attended the incident. "The crew attended to repair the customer's point of attachment (where the service wire connects to the property). It had become corroded," they said.

After chatting with the crews who fixed the issue, Sam and Alex now question whether their main fuse, which was reportedly installed in the late 1960s or early 1970s, should have been activated by the fault. The TT has asked Powercor for more information about the fuse and whether others of a similar age might need checking.

Sam said he was really impressed by the quick response of Powercor but believes it was a close call because the fault could have led to a fire. He advises residents to act quickly if they notice an electrical fault. "I'd love for it (our experience) to help someone. Anyone with electrical faults in their house should take it seriously, especially at such a hot time of year, because I'd hate for someone to lose their house to a fire."

I could not attend but did watch a video of the concert. What a joy to see young children join in the traditional music and dances with so much energy and spirit. Nothing funereal about that!

To say it is 'offensive and inappropriate' to conduct Survival Day on 'our national day' is bewildering. We cannot ignore the fact the two are inextricably linked unless we want to rewrite history. If we really are a compassionate society, we can celebrate both events with grace and respect. I do not find it

'tiresome' to be reminded of whose land we are on; I feel honoured and welcomed. I want to be reminded that January 26 is a 'day of grief for many Indigenous people', because it is. We must acknowledge our past just as we do when we stand silent every Anzac Day and Remembrance Day mourning the lives lost in wars. Is it so onerous to spend a few minutes remembering the loss of thousands of Aboriginal people killed by colonialists in the Frontier Wars and the subsequent decimation of their population and culture? Our footprint on this land is only 237 years old and much has been achieved worthy of celebration. The Indigenous people have been here for 60,000 years, worth taking a minute to think about.

I live in hope that generosity of spirit and compassion will lessen the divisions stoked by those who perpetuate it. *Mary Dalton Maldon*





Meta's moves to abandon fact-checking highlights the role of local papers



META'S plans for the removal of fact-checking services on content posted to its platforms and the government's decision to introduce age limits for access to social media has brought a renewed focus on the importance of regional, rural and local news publishers.

Country Press Australia president Andrew Schreyer said publishers have never been tasked with so many layers of responsibility, and it's never been more vital for the work they do to be appropriately recognised and valued by government and the broader community.

"The decisions local newsrooms make about content, photo selection, accuracy, fairness, balance and integrity go to the heart of the craft of journalism.

"Our papers don't engage in clickbait, they don't produce or publish fake AI content, they work hard to ensure mis and dis information are not allowed to fester in the communities we serve."

Mr Schreyer said the vast majority of Country Press Australia publishers are the only local media outlet with boots on the ground in these communities, producing public interest place-based journalism that fulfills a vital role in our democracy.

"Country Press Australia is disappointed at Meta's decision to abandon third-party fact checking on its Facebook and Instagram platforms in the US. Third-party fact checking has not yet been abandoned on Meta platforms in Australia, however the move in the US may be an indication of Meta's intentions worldwide and is a worrying development regardless."

Equally, Country Press Australia has welcomed Communications Minister Michelle Rowland's strong comments that came in the wake of Meta's announcement and her support for high quality fact checked information for the public, such as the place-based public interest journalism produced by Country Press Australia's 240 member mastheads.

"We are also heartened by comments from eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant on the harms of social media and the responsibility to comply with Australian law.

"The mis and disinformation that spreads on Meta's platforms are harmful to people's health, wellbeing and to social cohesion. This information can be hard for consumers to recognise. The removal of third-party fact checking will see the levels of mis and disinformation on social media increase exponentially. Without any fact checking mechanism the rates of mental health issues caused by social media will no doubt rise", Mr Schreyer said.

He commended the government for its recently announced News Bargaining Incentive and News Media Assistance Program funding which will help Country Press Australia member publishers continue to produce the quality local public interest journalism that is so well trusted by its audiences.

"Professionally produced local public interest journalism, such as that produced by Country Press Australia mastheads, is the antidote to mis and disinformation and this has been well recognised by the government."

THE Tarrangower Cactus Control Group (TCCG) has relaunched its Farm Fence Sign initiative to combat the ongoing Wheel Cactus problem in the region. Residents and visitors may have noticed updated Farm Fence Signs appearing across the area, reminding the community of the persistent threat posed by this invasive species.

Over time, many of the previous signs had faded or fallen down, prompting TCCG to refresh and replace them as part of an ongoing education and awareness campaign. These new signs serve as a crucial reminder that Wheel Cactus remains a serious issue, and collective vigilance is necessary to prevent its spread. TCCG continues to work closely with local authorities, including the Shire and VicRoads, to identify and address roadside infestations. The group encourages all landowners and community members to remain proactive in identifying and removing Wheel Cactus from their properties.

Book launch



Natural Newstead

Good story

MANY bird species, from large to small, will use the same nest site over multiple years.

For as long as I can recall, at least more than a decade, Nankeen Kestrels have used this site in a dead tree on the Moolort Plains.

Each time I pass the site I casually inspect the hollow for activity, however the past couple of years have been barren and I had started to think that site was no longer in use. Certainly raptor numbers on the plains have declined in recent times.


What a delight then to see another successful breeding event. As I passed the site on 2 January one juvenile was visible, upon close inspection a second one could be seen and then a few minutes later a trio of youngsters were jostling in the sunshine at the entrance.

I paid another visit on 6 January to watch both parents arriving with food. One juvenile was already flying, returning to the hollow from a nearby perch.



BLAST FROM THE PAST



The 1917 conscription referendum

ON 7 November 1917 the Australian Prime Minister William Hughes announced that a second conscription 'referendum' would be held on 20 December. Twelve months earlier Hughes' first attempt to introduce conscription for overseas service had been defeated. Under his new proposal voluntary enlistment would continue but a ballot of single men would be used to fill any shortfall in recruitment.

As with the 1916 vote, the 1917 campaign caused deep divisions within the Maldon community. On the 'No' side Cr William Preece formed the Maldon Anti-Conscription League, while local GP Dr Colin Gray established a local branch of the Reinforcements Referendum Council to advocate for a 'Yes' vote. The divisions seem more pronounced given that many individuals on both sides had worked closely to establish Anzac Hill, which was officially opened a few days before Hughes launched his campaign.

Both sides held rallies featuring advocates for their cause. On Sunday 25 November, the Anti-Conscription League held a 'pleasant Sunday afternoon' at the Shire Gardens. At this meeting Miss Mary Grant, of the Women's Peace Army, addressed a crowd of about 300 on the deleterious impact of conscription in New Zealand. She was introduced by William Preece who said the meeting was a rare chance for the 'No' side to put their case as nearly all of the press were against them.

Mary Grant refuted Hughes' claim that there were insufficient volunteers to reinforce Australia's divisions in France. She claimed that his aim was to create a military regime at home that would suppress Australia's democracy. Grant had seen the impact of conscription in New Zealand where conscientious objectors were treated as criminals and she believed that if it was introduced to Australia that there would be violence in the streets.

Local Protestant ministers condemned the Anti-Conscription League for holding a political meeting on Sunday and said that most locals opposed it as it brought the town into disrepute. Robert Smith, the head teacher of the State School, objected to the League distributing leaflets advertising the meeting at the School's gate. He claimed that as Grant was a member of the Socialist Party, she was an atheist and a disloyal anarchist opposed to all the values he and his fellow teachers were trying to instil in their students.

The same weekend that Mary Grant spoke, the Anti-Conscription League built the 'VOTE NO' sign on Preece's Hill using large, whitewashed stones. After many efforts to destroy it, the sign would become an icon of the Anti-Conscription movement. Today the stones form a large 'V' on the hill.

On 20 December Australia rejected conscription by a larger margin than in 1916. Victoria, which had voted 'Yes' in 1916, voted 'No' in 1917. In Maldon a narrow majority again voted 'No'.

Holocaust Remembrance Day

January 27 this year marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, the network of Nazi concentration and death camps in occupied Poland. Auschwitz has become the dominant symbol of the Holocaust. The camps were used for slave labour and mass extermination of people considered subhuman or 'other'. These included ethnic Poles, Roma, Soviet prisoners of war, people with disabilities, homosexuals and, the biggest target of all, Jews. 'Othering' is a phenomenon by which some individuals or groups are defined and labelled as not fitting in within the norms of a social group. To one survivor, five years old when she and her mother were sent to the Auschwitz-Birkenau extermination camp, it was 'normal' that "as a Jewish child they all had to die". The Holocaust is a reminder of what can happen when prejudice takes over.

Each year survivors of the camps return to the site, along with world leaders, to remember the day it was finally liberated on 27 January 1945. This year it was the few survivors, most in their 80s and 90s, whose voices were heard at the commemoration. Their message was to tell the world what happened there, to ensure it never happens again. In commemorating Holocaust Day, we are not just remembering a past historic event. In the words of King Charles, "The act of remembering the evils of the past remains a vital task and in so doing, we inform our present and shape our future."

It isn't easy to keep the memory alive when most of the survivors have gone. Often, we must depend on written accounts to hear their voices. Reading about events such as the Holocaust can be confronting, and it is normal to shy away from being reminded of such horror. The stories, however, can be both harrowing and inspiring. The Nazis Knew My Name is the autobiography of Magda Hellinger, who in 1942 as a 25-year-old kindergarten teacher, was deported as one of the first Jews to be sent to the Auschwitz concentration camp. The Choice by Edith Eger is the survival story of the 16-year-old ballerina and gymnast who was sent to Auschwitz, enduring unimaginable experiences. When the camp was liberated, Edith was pulled from a pile of bodies, barely alive. Her choice was to learn to live with strength and resilience. The Happiest Man on Earth is the autobiography of Eddie Jaku, published in the year he turned 100. Over seven years, Eddie faced unimaginable horrors every day, first in Buchenwald, then in Auschwitz, then on a Nazi death march. Because he survived, Eddie made the vow to smile every day. He believed he was the 'happiest man on earth'. Beyond Belief by Dee White is a work of historical fiction, inspired by the true story of Muslims who saved the lives of Jewish children in Paris during the Second World War. Finally, for younger readers, Milkweed is a young adult historical fiction novel by Jerry Spinelli. The book is about a boy in Warsaw, Poland during the Holocaust, who is taken in by a Jewish group of orphans. As one reader described it, "This was a very sweet and slightly heartbreaking read. Told from



the perspective of a street rat growing up in the Holocaust, this book invites you to question what it really means to be family, to love, and to lose."

Library reviews

The Truth According to Us by Annie Barrows, 2015

In the summer of 1938, Layla Beck's father, a United States senator, cuts off her allowance and demands that she find employment on the Federal Writers' Project, a New Deal jobs program. Within days, Layla finds herself far from her accustomed social whirl, assigned to cover the history of the remote mill town of Macedonia, West Virginia, and destined, in her opinion, to go completely mad with boredom. But once she secures a room in the home of the unconventional Romeyn family, she is drawn into their complex world and soon discovers that the truth of the town is entangled in the thorny past of the Romeyn dynasty.

Bryce Courtenay: Story Teller by Christine Courtenay, 2022

Bryce Courtenay was a born storyteller. The success of his extraordinary debut The Power of One made publishing history and in the years that followed Bryce continued to entertain and inspire thousands of devoted readers around the world with his sweeping epics and larger-than-life characters who embody the strength and triumph of the human condition.

When Christine Courtenay began penning her own memoir during lockdown, she found herself increasingly drawn to the remarkable story of her late husband's life and reflecting upon his astonishing literary legacy. From his humble beginnings in Africa to his dazzling success in advertising and as a bestselling author, Bryce's extraordinary, rags-to-riches life story reads like one of his epic novels. It was a life marked by all the big themes, overcoming adversity, love, loss, hard-won success, fame and fortune, and holding tight to a dream.

The Magician's Son by Sandy McCutcheon, 2006

This memoir describes Sandy McCutcheon's long search for his own identity, so in it he reveals far more depth and the real person than in his airport thrillers. One can understand that to be adopted with no idea of his heritage left a gaping emptiness in Sandy's life. He travelled the world, listening to various accents, hoping that some clue would spark memories. In the process he became a man of the world, absorbing various cultures and becoming fluent even in the most difficult languages like Finnish. After a life-long search, a radio interview while launching a book in New Zealand drew a phone call that led him to meet relatives, although his mother had not long died. McCutcheon writes movingly of his journeys to find self. This is an engrossing book. (Review by Ruth Bonetti)

Our Kind of Traitor by John Le Carre, 2010

Perry and Gail are idealistic and very much in love when they splurge on a tennis vacation at a posh beach resort in Antigua. But the charm begins to pall when a big-time Russian money launderer enlists their help to defect. In exchange for amnesty, Dima is ready to rat out his vory (Russian criminal brotherhood) compatriots and expose corruption throughout the so-called legitimate financial and political worlds. Soon, the guileless couple find themselves pawns in a deadly endgame whose outcome will be determined by the victor of the British Secret Service's ruthless internecine battles.





WOW, we're certainly getting a real summer this year! It's been a while since we've had so many hot days in a row. But it truly feels like summer and with that comes a relaxed, cruisy vibe. What better place to enjoy a warm day than under the old oak tree at the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre's Market, listening to live local music while treating yourself to delicious food and unique shopping?

Introducing our new bread maker: Barbora Bosanka

This month, we're excited to welcome Barbora Bosanka from Bread and Bagels by Barbora. Originally from Slovakia, Barbora moved to Australia 14 years ago to study ICT (Information and Communication Technology) and never left! She and her partner settled in Baringhup 10 years ago, and she has been an Australian citizen for six years.

Barbora's love for sourdough bread comes from her mother, who always baked for the family. In Slovakia, a traditional method of bread-making involves using cooked potatoes, a technique not commonly found in other European baking traditions.

> "In 2023, my mum visited from Slovakia and taught me how to make potato sourdough bread,

> > just like when I was a girl," Barbora shares. "That was my inspiration to start making this bread for friends and family and they loved it!"

Encouraged by her friends, Barbora started selling her bread at the

Baringhup Community Market, where she consistently sold out within an hour. With such high demand, she and her partner invested in setting up a fully equipped food premises on their farm, complete with two ovens and council-approved facilities. Soon after, she approached local farmers' markets and was immediately welcomed into the community.

Her arrival at the Maldon Market was perfectly timed, as Ken from Bread Builders had just announced his retirement from market baking.

The secret to Barbora's bread? Potatoes! Adding cooked potatoes to her sourdough starter creates a moist, delicious flavour.

"For each market bake, I peel, cut, and cook 35kg of potatoes to add to my leaven (sourdough starter). It's a labour-intensive process, but it's a tradition I want to keep alive," she explains.

Barbora bakes overnight to ensure her bread is fresh for the market. Even her partner, who previously wasn't a big bread fan, now eats half a loaf in one sitting!

And let's not forget her bagels—a true treat! Come along this Sunday and try Barbora's authentic, old-world bread and bagels.

What's on at the Market?

There will be plenty of shady spots to enjoy a coffee or a delicious meal from our food makers, all while listening to local music duo 'Deuce'.

At the gate and on the BBQ this Sunday, we're supporting the Maldon Croquet Club, so you know your donation is going to a great cause.

Join us at this summer market to meet our makers and growers, explore fantastic local produce and handmade products, and support small businesses.

Is there a tennis player you admire and why? I admire Roger Federer- a tennis champion, a great showman ana gracious person.


