hanks go to Maldon resident Barry Murfett, who read last week's article in the Times about a postcard (c. 1907) which pictures an early motorbike. Barry put the Times in touch with Greg Smith, the owner of an antique motorbike which is almost certainly the machine pictured on the old

Greg, who lives near Bendigo, has owned the motorbike since 2003 and he was intrigued to see that the bike in the early postcard was painted with the word 'Tarrangower'. "My

reference books on early Australian motorbikes call this the 'Maldon'," Greg said. "And that's the name that my bike carries today."

The *Times* visited Greg and wife Denise to photograph the bike and was thrilled to find that here is a couple who have a vintage car comfortably ensconced in their living area! It's a beautiful, immaculate Schacht - an American car built in 1909 that was owned by Gerald Buckley of Buckley & Nunn fame for 50 years.

who has done quite a bit of preliminary research: attached to the bike is a brass plaque which states that it was built by W. Mead of Maldon. Mr W. Mead set up his business in the old Warnocks building in 1898, selling a grab bag of products - everything from bicycles, sewing machines and pianos to seeds, plants and books.

In 1906, the *Times* wrote about "...a set of parts of a 'Tarrangower' motor bicycle which will next week be built into a complete machine (the first in this district)."

Fire/car accident report



IT was all quiet locally on the fire front this week, but some crews from the region went to lend their support at the huge fire burning in the Beaufort area.

Both Newstead and Maldon Fire Brigades were called out last week to assist at car accidents.

For the Newstead Brigade, it was the second car accident in a week. In both cases, ambulance services were required. The first was a two-car collision which resulted in one person being taken by ambulance to hospital. The second was a more serious accident, with the air ambulance being called in to take the sole occupant to hospital.

The Maldon Fire Brigade attended an accident on the Maldon-Castlemaine Road last week where a car swerved to avoid a kangaroo and ended up on its roof. The driver, the sole occupant of the car, did not require hospital treatment.

Councillor split

IN a split vote at last week's Council meeting - with the matter decided by the Mayor's casting vote - Councillors approved the subdivision of farmland so that the owners could build a second house. This decision goes against the advice of Council's own officers, which recommended that the planning permit application be refused.

Council's vote gives permission to build a house on a site of around 3 hectares on a 54-hectare farm at Watson Street, on the outskirts of Castlemaine.

Cr Rosie Annear absented herself from the Council chamber during the vote. Councillors Gardner, McLure and Henderson voted against, while Councillors Maltby, Cordy and Driscoll voted for the proposal. Cr Driscoll, as Mayor, then used his vote to tip the scales in favour of the application.

Cr McLure pointed out that approving the application would set a precedent, where Council could be continually asked to cut up farming land for one or two houses. Cr Gardner deemed the proposal "...development by stealth."

Those in favour of the proposal were of the view that building a second dwelling on the land would not affect the continued use of the land for agriculture.

Cleanaway wins tender

COUNCILLORS voted at last Tuesday's meeting to award the kerbside waste and recycling tender to Cleanaway.

One of five companies to submit a tender, Cleanaway will be contracted for an initial period of seven years, with the option of a three-year extension. The total estimated contract value is \$36 million.

And here's a pleasing detail: Council will be considering a recommendation of a green waste recycling system, and also one for glass, at a future Council meeting.

OVER 40 people attended last Thursday night's councilinitiated Flood Resilience Recovery meeting at the Newstead Community Centre. The meeting was held to raise awareness of any relief assistance that may be available to those affected by the recent storm event and to give the community an opportunity to reach out for any support.

Neale Chandler, one of Council's Community Flood Resilience Recovery Coordinators, apologised for the short notice, which was precipitated by the short window of opportunity to have psychologist and national disaster expert David Younger speak to the community and offer tips for recovering well and answer any questions.

Resources were provided, which included pamphlets on Emergency Essentials, a Heatwave Action Plan and Building Resilience - Making Homes climate ready. A delicious meal was also made available free to all attendees at the beginning of the evening.

The article, when outlining John's military service during WWII, stated that after serving with the secretive Special Operations Executive behind enemy lines

"...John was posted back to Australia where he joined the Z Force Special Unit (the equivalent of the today's SAS) as a major.'

This is incorrect. John was one of a number of officers from SOE who were detached to Special Operations Australia, also known under its wartime cover name of the Services Reconnaissance Department. He worked in Z Special Unit, a British non-operational unit which was categorically NOT the equivalent of today's SAS.

John spent the remainder of his service establishing contact with Allied prisoners of war, and then demobilising British servicemen.

Maldon's motorbike mystery

A month later, the *Times* breathlessly announced that Mr Mead's motor cycle had been completed and taken out for a trial run. "It runs very smoothly and appears to be far superior to any motor we have yet seen here," the *Times* wrote.

The following month, the *Times* reported that Mr Col McArthur bought the 'Tarrangower' and had been having a fine old time riding it around the area.

Fast forward to 1910, and W. Mead was still in business, advertising that he had been appointed local agent for a motor company supplying cars and motorbikes with prices ranging from 275 pounds to an eye-watering 1,350 pounds. And W. Mead was something of a multitasker - in the same paper, he advertised his services as a tax agent.

According to Greg, there were many motor bikes being built in country towns at the time that the 'Tarrangower' bike was created. "They were mainly made from parts that came from England and Europe," he said. "For instance, the 'Tarrangower' was made from a B.S.A. frame from England, and a Minerva motor that was manufactured in Belgium."

Greg describes the 'Tarrangower' (or is that the 'Maldon'?!) as basically a motorised push bike. With no gear box and clutch, the bike basically has only one speed, with pedals to help start it.

What about brakes? "It now has brakes, but originally there weren't any," Greg said. "There wasn't much traffic on the road back in the early days, so there wasn't as much need for brakes!"

The longest journey that Greg has undertaken on the bike was a trip from Sydney to Melbourne. "It was a re-enactment of the 1905 Dunlop reliability trials and it took five days," he said. Member of an antique bike club, Greg is going on a more sedate ride next weekend, across to Llanelly and back.

Greg was thrilled to see the postcard reproduced in the *Times*. "It wasn't just that I found out that the name of the bike was actually the 'Tarrangower' and not the 'Maldon'," he said. "It also confirmed that the handlebars on the bike are identical to the original ones."

The postcard throws up a further question for Greg. "Who is the man in the hat?" he asked. "Is it Col McArthur, the first owner of the bike?"

Greg is quite certain that there was only ever one 'Tarrangower' motor bike ever made by W. Mead, and that is the bike that he has in his possession.

But will he change the name painted on his bike - from 'Maldon' back to 'Tarrangower'? "I might leave that job to the next owner." he said.

A policy about having a policy

AT last Tuesday's Council meeting, Councillors unanimously voted to adopt a Formal Positions of Council Policy which will clarify how Council responds to issues which are beyond Council's remit and on which there is no existing Council position. The need for this policy has arisen due to residents calling upon Council to take a stand on a specific event, for instance the ongoing conflict in Gaza. Some councils in Victoria - most notably larger metropolitan ones - have adopted policies on matters such as the crisis in Gaza, as well as a range of State, Federal and International political issues.

The Councillors are of the opinion that it is inappropriate for a small rural shire with limited resources to adopt policies on highly complex national and global issues.

Cr Rosie Annear said that Council needed to stay "...as micro as we can. We're a small council with finite resources. We can't be a metropolitan council out in rural Victoria."

Fashioned Confectionery; Gourmet Cordials and Delicious Chocolates cover the Maldon classic bike show? New kid on the block Blythe jumps at the chance, great, bikes, I'm in, I love classic bikes. Reality slowly dawns - it is push bikes, not motor bikes.

Smythe and Robinson high five each other and laugh uncontrollably. What are you going to do here, Blythe, how are you going to inject some excitement into this event? Easy, as it turned out, just talking to the three men involved was a great start.

Peter Gray, Michael McCartney and Jim Knight live and breathe classic and vintage road racing bikes, and fortunately for this writer their passion and knowledge is contagious. Well, their passion is anyway - I still can't tell a derailleur from a side stand. This is essentially a show and shine for state of the art elite road racing machinery pre 2000s - either immaculately kept, or lovingly restored back to pristine concourse condition.

The courage of the men who use these machines for their intended purpose is beyond dispute. Elite riders often reach speeds up 120KMH on downhill sections, perched on 21mm tyres that have been glued to the rim, tyres made of linen with a realistic working life of about an hour. They are visibly disintegrating while you are doing these insane speeds. Death is a constant companion on these hell rides.

To illustrate the point Michael arranged the four of us literally touching shoulder to shoulder. He now explains in his own words: "Imagine that your front wheel is mere inches away from the rear one of the rider in front. Now if they brake or try to avoid something or suffer a mechanical failure, 20 or more riders could hit the road, with no more protective gear than a polystyrene helmet."

It would be carnage. There simply is no margin for error in an elite peloton that is best described as combative, more than competitive. This may consist of 30 or 40 riders, maybe more. The writer called barley - he was just too traumatised to continue the article.

The writer left in search of strong drink. To his receding back, Mike yells, "We will get you in the saddle yet Mark" to which the writer responded, "In ya dreams, McCartney."

The back story: Townwide Garage Sales have been a regular event in Maldon since 2009. The only break in the continuity was during the COVID years, like many events. Originally employed to generate interest in, and flesh out, a sparsely populated fledgling Maldon Antique Fair, it has since assumed a life of its own.

The first two years were run by the Maldon Lawn Bowls Club, but over the years this event that began with 20 to 30 houses has exploded into something along the lines of 10 to 15 percent of all the houses in Maldon. That is roughly 70 to 80 houses. Maldon Inc. took over the event from 2011 until 2022, then the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre took it on.

Kareen is an ardent admirer of painting, having studied painting herself. She says of Liz, "Sullivan is primarily an oil painter and works on solid gesso-primed boards. The approach is quite deliberate and fast, blocking in with acrylic and then building up with oil paint. There is a vigorous sketchy drawn quality to her mark-making. Sullivan will sit on the ground for hours to get into the rhythm of building up layers and layers, often working from all four sides of the picture plane. Unlike classic studio easel painters, Sullivan does not step back to see the work, preferring to stay face-to-face and up close until much later in the not answerable to the past and


to reality'. It is the voice inside my head

Vale Jim Millwood

4/11/1942 - 10/02/2024

WELL-KNOWN and loved Maldon identity, Jim Millwood, died of COVID-related complications and underlying

Parkinson's Disease on Saturday, 10 February.

He was one of my oldest and best friends. We met in Canberra in 1967.

The man was so many things. He had an Honours Degree in Psychology, a Bachelor of Economics and an MBA. He was a Banker and a Statistician in Canberra, then in 1997 became a highly sought-after Market Research guru in Melbourne.

He was also a racing driver with the hottest Cooper S in the ACT, who liked to set his own lap records around the Canberra Lake at dawn before the police patrols were awake. He raced on the touring car and hill-climb circuits. He played drums. He painted and made pottery. He was the sober, thoughtful man

in the suit and polished shoes who set fire to his apartment when experimenting with highly-flammable paints. Who went out to buy a second-hand station wagon and came back with a Lotus Europa.

He married Pam on 29 November 1969. It was to be one of the longest and strongest marriages of my generation. We lost touch somewhere around the millennium. In 2007 we caught up in Sydney after I'd told them that I had changed gender. An act which cost me my family and most of my friends. But not them. They were people who lived by their principles and their principles were, and are, some of the finest I know. Their

exquisitely-renovated Melbourne apartment became a haven for me in the dark days following my Transition.

They shifted to Maldon in 2009 and invited me to stay in 2010 when my time was up in Sydney.

By then Jim's Parkinson's Disease was manifesting strongly. To see a man of such intellect, probing intelligence, and instinctive integrity take on that battle with such dignity and his deep, dark humour was a heartbreak.

"I'm on this new medication,"
he told me. "It's supposed to alleviate the symptoms. What I'd
like to do is go down to the local
racetrack and set my fastest time in a
Go-cart without the meds. Then take the
meds and see how much I improve! But I don't

think Pam'll let me."

That was the scientist and the devil in him. Or the statistician and the artist. I see the scientist and the artist in his children. Shelley, the vet. Grayson, the choreographer/dancer/theatre artist. Above all I saw a quiet man of deep reserve and of deep compassion.

Some time before he died he pondered on how his and my lives had taken such different arcs. He had chosen the outwardly conservative life and I one of chaos, uncertainty and movement. Yet, in the end, we were both getting old together in Maldon. And, in the end, it was his values that shone through: integrity and honour and a life lived to the full. Farewell, dear friend.

Natural Newstead

Down the rabbit hole ...

EARLIER this week, as we were travelling home from the coast via Kooroocheang, I was reminded of what I think is a remnant stand of Silver Banksia on Wilsons Road. A short diversion was taken to capture some images – a task I had been meaning to complete for some years. The roadside plants at Kooroocheang are tall shrubs, with a handful of regenerating seedlings. They were laden with flowers in various stages of development. I'm sure a visit in the early morning would reveal local honeyeaters supping on the nectar.



Silver Banksia *Banksia marginata* is now rare in central Victoria although it often features in revegetation projects and as a garden specimen. The Traditional Owners of central Victoria, the Dja Dja Wurrung, know this species as *wurrak*, and it was valued for a multitude of uses – the nectar as a sugary drink, the wood shaped into needles for weaving, the dried flowers to strain drinking water, to list just a few.


Silver Banksia was colloquially known as native honeysuckle and some of the early survey maps are annotated to show the location of honeysuckle. So, off I went to the Public Records Office Victoria in search of a map that I recall looking at some years ago. I'm not sure if I found this same map, but I did find what I was after – *Plan of the Upper Part of the Loddon and Coliban Rivers and their tributaries also Mount Alexander*, a beautifully hand drawn and shaded map from the mid-1800s (the map is undated but was apparently drawn before the township of Newstead was surveyed around 1860).

There, just north of Kooroocheang (marked KOORAT-YANG) were the words – *Undulating grassy land timbered very lightly in places with Lightwood and Honeysuckle.* I would love to be able to jump in a time-machine and walk through the

groves of Honeysuckle and Lightwood (*Acacia implexa*)!

Over the years we've planted a number of Silver Banksias in our home garden. Most have failed to thrive, apart from one specimen that is now a healthy tall shrub. Until this morning I had never enjoyed seeing a flower spike, in fact I had rarely taken a close look until I spotted one earlier on a Silver Banksia at the Newstead Arts Hub. Planted a number of years back this one is now thriving in a spot where it would have once flourished.

Straying stock

REBECCA Hamilton, a merino farmer at Bradford, took the opportunity at last week's Council meeting to advise Councillors about the increasing problem of stray stock - both in Mount Alexander Shire and the City of Greater Bendigo.

Local Laws attended recently when a stray sheep was caught, its ear tag was not scanned and it was put over the nearest fence. The sheep did not belong to the farmer and could have infected the flock with a disease. In that particular instance.

Mrs Hamilton pointed out that her farm has 16,000 breeding ewes with up to 40,000 sheep on the farm during lambing; the potential cost of one stray sheep with a disease contaminating that number of stock is enormous.

Mrs Hamilton emphasised the need for biosecurity awareness and suggested GPS trackers and contact with local farmers as ways of dealing with stray livestock. She indicated that she was keen to read the Shire's policy regarding stray animals.

Michael Annear Director Infrastructure and Development apologised for the error that was made by the Local Laws officer. It would appear from his reply that the policy regarding stray animals would be reviewed as a result of Mrs Hamilton's input.



BLAST FROM THE PAST



THE BOOK LOVERS CLUB

THE Maldon Book Lovers Club held its first meeting at the home of Miss Effie Laidler on the evening of 3 May 1935. Most of the Club's members were women who were also members of the Maldon branch of the C.W.A.. Club members took turns to host meetings at their homes.

A week following its foundation the Club again met at Effie Laidler's home to discuss a "modern play", J.M. Barrie's What Every Women Knows. During 1935 the Club then met fortnightly to discuss works including Basil Mathews' Clash of Color, a study of race relations in the British Empire, Nathan Spievogel's Old Eko's Note Books, a novel based on the author's experiences as a teacher in the Wimmera and Shakespeare's Taming of the Shrew. The Club also held discussions of humourous plays and Australian poetry and prose. They wound up their year in December with a bush ramble and a discussion of Cobbers, a recent sympathetic account of Australians by the Englishman, Dr Thomas Wood.

A feature of the Club was the charming syllabuses produced each year. These small hand made booklets contained the Club's schedule of meetings, listing for each meeting the date, subject and name of the hostess. The cover was usually a sketch or watercolour with the Club's motto, "Through Literature to Life". Inside the cover were the Club's objectives. These included the cultivation of a taste for reading and members' powers of observation and thought. The Club also sought to broaden the views of its members and provide them with opportunities to express their opinions. Both the Maldon Museum and the Athenaeum have collections of these syllabuses.

While the Club invited men to join, its membership was overwhelmingly female. From lists of hostesses and also autographs on syllabuses in the Museum's collection, the average Club membership was probably about twelve and included several teachers posted to the Maldon State School.

Apart from literary discussions, Club meetings also included visiting speakers, usually talking about their overseas travel, and picture nights at the Royal Theatre in High Street. Each year in May the Club held a birthday meeting to commemorate the anniversary of its formation.

In 1937 the Club's celebrated its birthday with a "Go As You Are, Humourous Evening". Several visitors attended the meeting and a number of members wore fancy dress based on the books that the Club had discussed. During the meeting Club president Florence Kelly cut a beautifully decorated birthday cake.

The Club was not afraid to discuss social, political and international issues. Its 1945 syllabus included titles such as What Chance Has Your Child?, Housing the Australian Nation, What About India? and Patterns for Peace.


Monster Book Sale, World Wildlife Day and World Book Day

BRENDA Shingles is one of the Dhelkaya Health volunteers who heads the social walking groups that meet at the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre every Monday and Friday at 9.30am. "When we finish the walk, which is the exercise part, we come back here to the Neighbourhood Centre and we sit down, have a cup of coffee, and just have a general chinwag," said Brenda. "You just turn up, we head out... you can simply take in the surroundings or chat away about anything or nothing in particular."

Depending on the weather, it might be a quick walk around the outside of the town. Or a walk towards the

North British mine, the South German mine...

"There are lots of people in the walking group who are very knowledgeable on the local history. So, if you see the 'V' on the hill while out walking, there'll be someone in the group to explain what it's about."



MAKE a note in your diary for the 9 March long weekend when Maldon Campdraft will be putting on a display of skill and agility at Racecourse Reserve, corner of Lewis and Bendigo Roads.

The event, scheduled to start at 6.30am on both Saturday and Sunday, invites locals and visitors alike to witness the



thrilling sport of campdrafting, an Australian tradition that showcases the incredible partnership between rider and horse.

Organiser Tricia James extends a warm invitation to all, encouraging a \$2 donation from attendees to help boost the event's first aid supplies. A collection tin will be conveniently located on the right-hand side of the gate as guests drive in.
