

THE Mount Alexander Model Aircraft Club (MAMAC) is the local radiocontrolled model flying club in our region.

It was formed by a small but enthusiastic group, back in 2015.

From having seven members in August that year, the number has steadily grown to where there are now 17 members. Three members, including the club's President and Treasurer, live in Maldon.

While most members reside in the Mount Alexander Shire, others come from a variety of locations such as Ballarat, Daylesford, Maryborough, and

They have created two runways, along with an access road, carpark, pit area and viewing area. Thanks are due to Marc Hanson

Garden Maintenance, and Lang Cartage and Drainage for the help and support that they have provided.

The club has members with various levels of experience and skill. New members are welcome, and anyone from total beginners up to experts are encouraged

The club prides itself on being friendly and welcoming, and advice and support will be provided to new members who need it. Several new members have been taught to fly and now enjoy the pleasure of guiding their model planes around the sky by remote control.

Committee member Keith Harper said he had an interest in aeroplanes, and model planes, for a long time before taking up the hobby

"A few years back I saw an advertisement that led me to think that getting into flying model planes might not be as expensive or difficult as I previously thought," Keith said.

"At first I tried to teach myself to fly, and eventually had some success, but I don't recommend this approach. It is definitely better to make contact with a club in the first instance to get some guidance.

"You can be taught to fly using a 'buddy system', which allows an instructor to take back control at any time that you get into difficulty."

MAMAC is affiliated with the Victorian Model Aircraft Association (VMAA), and the Model Aircraft Association of Australia (MAAA), which provides the essential insurance cover for the activities of the club, as well as representing the model flying hobby at a national

Flying takes place at Newstead at random times during the week when weather conditions are suitable. Saturday morning is 'Club Morning', and flying will usually take place as long as it is not too windy, or raining.

Anyone who is interested in visiting the field to watch the flying or talk to members is welcome to come along.

which received a total of 238

This year, nine trees from the National Trust Significant Tree Register were shortlisted for the coveted award, with six of the finalists hailing from metro Melbourne and three from regional Victoria.

Meanwhile a new breed of doulas are helping break down the fear around death, which they say shouldn't be a confronting word.

Carmen Barnsley from Melbourne said just like birth doulas, death doulas were there to provide support, knowledge and assistance during times of upheaval and uncertainty. "I find it is just a privilege and a humbling experience to be where life enters this world and when life leaves it," the former nurse said.

In Simon's photographic exhibition, he has arranged dead birds on porcelain plates as in *L'Oiseau Mort*, and then photographed them in an echo of the Victorian custom of *Memento Mori*.

Simon's Artist Statement says that, 'Here begins the considered, conscious exploring of images that must include on an ephemeral level the intimacy of those departed flying souls who soar post mortem without feather or wings.'

Nicola's installation in EDGE Below, show her works which include everyday objects, well used by persons unknown, which are stitched together, obsessively. With stitches not unlike sutures which bind the fleshy fabrics together. The combination of household objects with tiny stitches and knots holding back the materials that 'want to burst into the room'.

Nicola's statement concludes with the remarks that, 'self loathing, religious dogma, abuse and shame become self flagellating stitches and knots that hold us back, creating an immense tension, as our suffering, emotions and

Wildlife Act to be reformed – have your say



AN independent expert panel appointed to review the state's Wildlife Act 1975 is calling for public submissions to ensure the revised Act is fit for purpose and in line with peoples' values and expectations.

The Act, which protects and conserves wildlife, has not been reviewed since it became law more than 45 years ago.

The panel was established in December 2020 by Energy, Environment and Climate Change Minister Lily D'Ambrosio.

The review will consider the objectives and scope of the Act to ensure it provides a comprehensive framework to achieve its key objectives of protecting wildlife.

The review will also consider whether the Act recognises and protects the rights and interests of Traditional Owners and Aboriginal Victorians and their role in decision making related to wildlife.

The panel will also look at the best ways to encourage compliance with the Act and whether offences and penalties are appropriate.

This follows community outrage over recent instances of illegal poisoning of wedge-tailed eagles and an incident involving injured and starving koalas.

Panel member Emeritus Professor Arie Freiberg AM said, "The Victorian concern about the sentences - this review will consider

communities can build a collective vision for a carbon reduced future opened in September, and will close on Saturday 15 May.

Mount Alexander Shire Councillor Rosie Annear said she was delighted with the responses to date.

'We have received so many thoughtful responses and creative ideas," Annear said.

"To ensure we have a representative and accurate picture of our community's wants and needs we need as many people as possible to contribute. So please go online to www.oursay.org/ znetmountalexandershire and add your ideas, views and concerns. We want to hear from you."

Among other ideas to date

Contributions be fed into a master co-designed with communities across the shire to reduce carbon emissions from their activities.

Cr Annear represents Mount Alexander Shire Council on a steering group set up to oversee the plan's development.

It includes representatives from the Mount Alexander Sustainability Group, the Central Victorian Greenhouse Alliance, Nalderun and others.

"In 2019 our Council declared a climate emergency and renewed our commitment to work with the community to reduce emissions and adapt to climate change," said Cr Annear.

"This builds on the substantial work of the Climate Forum in 2019 and is an important first stage in planning together and thinking creatively about how we can tackle one of the biggest challenges of our time, climate change."

Pedestrian crossing to be trialled in Main Street Maldon

point will be installed in Maldon this month.

The crossing point will be located between two local businesses, Maldon Quality Butchers and Tres Doux Tres Beau Salon, beside the Maldon Newsagency.

The temporary crossing will remain in place for four weeks.

The installation is being undertaken as part of the Maldon Streetscape Revitalisation Project, and will test four different kerb materials during the trial, as well as alternative landscape designs.

Prototype materials include exposed bluestone aggregate concrete, stone, steel and exposed quartz aggregate concrete.

Landscaping options include Indigenous plants, which are locally sourced and sympathetic to the natural environment.

Each of the prototype materials has been selected with consideration given to the Maldon Heritage Design Guidelines, and in consultation with the Heritage Working Group, project consultants, Council staff and local horticulturists.

While the trial pedestrian crossing point is in place, Maldon residents and visitors to the town are encouraged to visit the crossing, walk across it, and share their feedback on their experience with Council.

Feedback forms on the prototypes will be available from Monday 24 May, and can be collected from Maldon Quality Butchers and the Maldon Newsagency during business hours. Completed feedback forms can be placed in the collection boxes located at those two sites.

Online feedback forms will be available from Monday 24 May at shape. mountalexander.vic.gov.au/ Maldon-crossing.

"We're inviting people to use the pedestrian crossing point, and then tell us what they like about the various kerb and landscape options there," said Tanya Goddard, Manager Executive

What a Variety!

The books this week are so different that it seems unlikely that they would all appeal to the same readers but hopefully there will be one that is right for you.

A Wordsworth Treasury is an exquisite little book with a fine selection of poems by the great poet William Wordsworth. I don't often write about poetry even though I love it and the Athenaeum has a fine collection of poetry books. This little book has lovely illustrations and some of the greatest poems that Wordsworth wrote during his life. Wordsworth was a fascinating person with very different views on life from those held by the establishment at the time. He visited France during the very early years of the revolutionary movement. He fell in love with a French woman and they had a daughter but he returned to England and later married an English woman although he supported his daughter throughout his life.

Gallery Of The Dead is a thriller by Chris Carter. It's a chilling compulsive portrait of a psychopath written in a punchy and fast paced style. Detectives Hunter and Garcia from the Ultra-Violent Crimes Unit find themselves at one of the most shocking crime scenes imaginable. Perhaps this is not one to read at night if you're on your own with a good imagination.

Captivated, Entranced & Charmed form the first three books of the Donovan legacy by prolific and popular writer Nora Roberts. Captivated is the story of Nash Kirkland who unwillingly becomes attracted to a self-proclaimed witch, Morgana Donovan. Against his will he cannot rationalise away her magic and either he is being driven mad or she is telling the truth about her powers. Entranced is the story of a missing child and private investigator. Mel Sutherland finally has to enlist the aid of Sebastian Donovan to help find the child. Mel is cynical about Sebastian's powers but he seems to know unfailingly how to follow the abductor. Charmed is the story of Anastasia Donovan who has spent her life trying to hide her special powers because she was terrified of revealing them and the consequences that could result from that. When Boone Sawyer, the writer of fairy tales moved next door to her he became fascinated by her and determined to find out about her magical powers. An accident to a child meant that Anastasia could no longer hide her powers even if it meant risking her own life and happiness.

Another wonderful book for our junior readers is Lauren Child's Look After Your Planet. This is another book about Charlie and his little sister Lola. After Charlie explains about recycling to Lola she becomes the leader at their school for a big recycling effort. This is a wonderful little book to explain about the importance of properly recycling things to help save our planet. It's fun yet very instructive for all ages.

Well I did say that these were an eclectic group of books and now I'm sure that you will agree. Maybe you could try one that would usually not be in your normal reading range.

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



He said that since his first wife's death and his remarriage he had been persecuted. The full story would have come out if his son had been able to give evidence in court. He then provided Samuel's account of events.

Samuel said that on the morning he disappeared, his grandmother Mary Ward, who lived next door, called him over to her house. She then hid him in a locked room and, when his father came looking for him, he heard her say she had not seen him. Mary Ward later took him to a church meeting and then to the Grants' home where she left him telling Mrs Grant that he had been turned out of home.

The animosity between Davison and the Wards seems to have been common knowledge. Referring to the court case and Davison's advertisement, the *Times* offered the advice of a popular song, 'Above all close the door on your mother-in-law'.
