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Sign sends shivers down spines



MALDON without the Beehive Mine Chimney would be like Paris without the Eiffel Tower. Completed in 1863 and standing 30 metres high, it is the only one of its age and size still standing in Victoria.

Two metres were removed from the top after damage from a lightning strike in 1923. There has also been some repair work at the base. The recent fencing and sign appeared three weeks ago and sent shivers down spines. Parks Victoria Area Chief Ranger Karen Doyle said, "Parks Victoria fenced off the Beehive Company Gold Mine chimney on August 22 following reports of fallen bricks from the 30-metre-high structure."

Karen Doyle said an independent engineering assessment will need to take place before next steps can be determined. Parks Victoria will continue to monitor public safety in Maldon Historic Reserve until they receive engineering advice on the status of the chimney stack. The Reserve remains open to locals and visitors who would like to stroll through the quartz mine site, which includes the fenced Beehive Company Gold

"We recognise the importance of this site to the local community and encourage locals and visitors to enjoy the 160-year-old attraction within Maldon Historic Reserve from a distance. We will continue to share updates with the local community," she said.

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Big bash at Newstead Men's Shed Open Day



AS part of celebrating 30 years of Men's Sheds in Australia, everyone was welcomed with open arms at the Newstead Men's Shed Open Day held last Saturday. There was plenty of chin-wagging, BBQing, show 'n' telling, look-arounds, showings-off and bragging displays, and the local school choir was in fine voice and high spirits to kickstart the singalongs.

Secretary Graeme Lees said he was delighted by the turnout. "Newstead is a community of around two and a half thousand. We've got about 36 members and a great reputation in the community. The community supports us, and we support them."

Some men don't get to go out much, so they come down to the Newstead Men's Shed to share a chat and a cuppa.

"During COVID, it was really difficult for some. Because they lost the ability to come here for a few years, we had to teach a lot of our guys to become digitally active, and we noticed the positive impact on their health at the time. It is a strong part of what Men's Sheds are about - giving people all types of opportunities.

"Every shed is different depending on what their skill sets are and what their members are prepared to do. But here, because it's such a small community, we have people coming down with their broken furniture and bits and pieces all the time for refurbishment or repair. We go out of our way and help a lot of community groups - the kindergarten and the primary school. We're doing a big job very shortly with 83 new plaques for the Avenue of Honour - providing labour and feeding the guys working on the day.'



A lot of people are now starting to see that Men's Sheds are not like they were a decade or so ago - just guys in a workshop with chisels and hammers making toy cars. It's a broader cross-section now with all sorts of skills. And they are attracting a lot more younger people.

When Graeme was asked how others can encourage someone they know to consider joining up, he said, "The best thing to do is don't talk to us on the phone. Don't put him on the phone. He's better off coming down, talking to us face-toface, and sharing a cup of tea with us. We'll walk around, we'll talk to him about what they want, what we can do, and that's the best way.

"It's about treating everybody with respect, particularly the older male generation. They're sometimes written off and they feel it at times, and their ability to be part of this community gives them that renewed confidence and renewed social skills."

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Newstead envisions its future



CYCLING/WALKING trails linking the Newstead Arts Hub to the centre of town and an urban forest strategy have topped a list of projects that the Newstead community would like to see developed.

These projects were among many to emerge at a visioning session at the Newstead Community Centre on Sunday, 10 September.

All up, 76 people attended to discuss the town's short and long-term needs. They were invited to discuss Newstead's future, the town's needs and what projects they might contribute to.

The session was organised by the community group Newstead 21 Inc., formerly known as Newstead 2021.

N21Inc President Gen Barlow said the Newstead community turned out in its usual supportive form, and many new connections were made.

"This wasn't about us at N21 saying we'd do these projects. It was about unearthing projects and a future that residents are willing to work on themselves, which is how things get done around here.

"The loudest and clearest call was for more volunteers and members, which came from every club and organisation represented.

"People are willing to help, and many clubs and organisations want to involve those people, so there's obviously a project there to look at ways they can be linked.

"Creating more shade along our streets and accessible walking and cycling trails is a strong priority. That's about enhancing opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to be physically active in and around the town."

A recent feasibility study into the Castlemaine-Maryborough Rail Trail, which will go through Newstead, also attracted a lot of interest, Gen said.

Locals strongly supported two cycling/walking paths linking the Newstead Arts Hub, formerly the Newstead Railway Station (where the CMRT will go through), to the centre of town and planting them out with trees and under-storey.

CMRT advocate Steve Foskey said that linking the planned rail trail to the town centre along attractive cycling/walking paths would help bring cyclists and walkers into town to spend at the local cafe, general store, supermarket and pub.

Other big ticket items were an urban forest strategy to keep the town's streets cool and shady, new toilets in Panmure Street, medium density housing for retirees and a call for ways to connect young families and provide more of what they need locally so they don't have to leave town as much.

Newstead 21 Inc will consider next steps and how it might use a \$100,000 Victorian Government grant to maximise impact in the community, in the light of this visioning, when it next meets on Oct 2. At the opening last Friday, a keen group of arts aficionados gathered to see her work, which is very colourful and at times quite funny, reflecting her quirky sense of humour.


Jacki's recycled mixed media works sold like hot cakes at the opening, with red dots abounding almost from the moment of opening.

So, how's business?

"We took over The Kangaroo Hotel on March the sixth 2020, and we got closed down on March the 28th. So, we had

about two and a half weeks of business. And it's been 'fluid' every day since. Every week things change, but that's business since COVID. You plan something, but it doesn't go to plan. So, then I just refocus and just do the best that I can with what's been thrown at me.

My dream was to have this amazing music venue, really good beer, good wine, good food, and very welcoming. We still have the good beer, good wine and welcoming, but it's not as busy as I would like it to be.

I've just been working with the ups and downs, but I'm just

keeping passionate. I do love the community. And I love this pub. 'She's' so beautiful and old and wonderful. I just feel the Roo is a 'she'. And I think the first publican to run it was a female, so I just get that vibe when I say 'she'. It might sound crazy to some, but it means a lot to me."

Where does that determination come from?

"It comes from my background. My Mum and my Dad came from poor families. I learnt that determination can accomplish many things. Whether everyone thinks the result is an accomplishment or not, or maybe only I do, I believe determination comes from within. To make things happen."

And I think that you can't be down for too long if you can help it because you don't want to bring that to the customers either. I try and stay on top of everything as well as possible. And if I need to debrief, I speak to the closest people around me."



A. Anxious.



"I think *anxious*. I think feeling anxious can be a good thing and bad thing. Having a pub, I think you're always anxious about who's going to come through the door, how many people are going to come in, are you going to cover your costs? Change can make you anxious but also excited.

Maldon is an amazing little town. I want to live here. And that sense of home feels amazing. It's so friendly and inviting. It's beautiful.

I originally came from Melbourne, born up in Deer Park, then went over to the UK for 13 years to run bars and clubs and restaurants. I came back here and then moved up to the country as soon as I could. I used to be a prison officer. And in that time, I did work at Tarrangower Prison, and that's when I first fell in love with Maldon."

"Maldon has amazing businesses with amazing business people in it. And we all have our own styles and our own quirks and our own characters. 

Response to last week's referendum question follows:

Q. Do other countries recognise Indigenous people in their constitution?

A. This question raises a serious concern about the current Voice referendum. One of our nation's leading silks, Stuart Wood KC, has warned that the referendum is vulnerable to legal challenge in the High Court because it misleads voters. The legal argument centres on the question placing the emphasis on recognition rather than the Voice. Recognition takes various forms around the world, but most seem to focus on some form of co-governance or even separate governance. In Victoria, the Andrews government is dabbling with co-governance models and expects punters to be happy with paying taxes, rates and charges to a body comprising some unelected members.

The New Zealand experience is foreboding of the perils of treaties. What originally began as a reasonable idea of co-existence has now become a contentious process. Do your own research. Lastly, regarding state recognition of indigenous people, the Victorian parliament owns the state constitution and not the people. So the recognition in the state's constitution does not have public endorsement.

Maggie may. Maggie may not.

(Assume the first. Hope for the second.)

IF there were a magpie version, it would go something like this: 'Spring is here. The grass is gris. You never know where maggie is.' It's peak breeding season for our local maggies, right through to November.

Swooping to defend their nests, chicks, and surrounding territory they may be. Their first little swoop can appear playful, especially to younger children. But a flutter of fun can quickly turn into beak clapping, screeching and whooshing above your head to warn you to keep away from their eggs or newly hatched chicks.

The dawn and dusk calls of the magpie are one of the most loved. But at this time of the year, the call goes out to everyone to be aware and ready for swooping maggies. Swooping birds may be a frightening or even dangerous experience. They can swoop in your own backyard, in parks and gardens, along bike tracks, in school yards, or anywhere maggies are nesting.

Here are the obligatory Top Ten Tips, this time to protect yourself against our local 'swoopers'.

1. Inform others of local swooping hotspots.

You can't beat local knowledge. Share 2. Avoid the area.

The best way to protect yourself from a swooping bird is to avoid venturing into their territory.

3. Move quickly. If you must pass through the area – move calmly and quickly - do not run.

4. Cover your head.

Wear a hat or carry a stick or umbrella above your head. Cyclists should keep their helmets on, dismount, and walk through the area.

5. Eyes at the back of your head.

Birds may be less likely to swoop if they think you are watching them. Draw a pair of 'eyes' and attach them to the back of hats and helmets. (Have young children draw the eyes - it's a way to talk about swooping maggies to them.)

6. Do not harass wildlife.

Don't interfere with or throw stones at birds. This gives them added reason to see humans as a threat and may increase swooping behaviour.

7. Do not destroy nests. This may prompt birds to rebuild their nests, prolonging the swooping behaviour.

8. Don't feed swooping birds. This may encourage swooping behaviour.

9. Travel in a group. If possible, try to travel in a group in areas where there are swooping birds.

10. Notify others. (Yes, it's repeated because it's important.) Put up warning signs for others who may not be aware there are swooping birds in the area.

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Maldon Central Heritage Precinct: Authentic, unique, important

MALDON has no heritage recognition now outside the Shire, save items with the State Heritage Commission. We have an application with the Australian Heritage Council (April 2023) asking for Commonwealth recognition similar to our heritage standing 50 years past. The immediate issue is that Maldon's claims of authenticity and uniqueness at an Australian level must be established now, or the town will be subsumed in a Victoria-wide Goldfields planning overlay, the World Heritage listing. Similar elements will be vigorously promoted by all 13 Victorian local government applicants. Our claims to goldfields heritage uniqueness would be compromised, yet we were first.

Part 1 of this series was the story of how we became 'notable' and began the Australian heritage movement. Part 2 explored the agricultural sector turbocharged by Major Thomas Mitchell, rapturising about the Moolort plains and the Loddon River as a springtime Australia Felix. This, the third part, focuses on the gold rush traders who catered to the needs of thousands of immigrants. Those traders built the Maldon Central Heritage Precinct, the focus for our claim to recognition by the Australian Heritage Council.

Traders followed the diggers

There's a great Goldfields picture by Edward Roper of the main Ararat rush of 1857. Replace the backdrop of Langhi Ghiran with Mount Franklin and the scene could be Maldon's Long Gully viewed from High Street in 1854, both goldfields a year into their respective rushes.



1858 watercolour by Edward Roper, The Goldfields of Australia, Ararat.

The picture shows the track winding up the hill past traders' tents, the denuded land pocked with shafts and mullock heaps, diggers sluicing, and an Aboriginal family watching all the activity. Roper included the heavy haulage of the transport industry - a bullock train - outside the foreground tents. These carriers of people and goods plied their routes through the ports and markets of Melbourne, Geelong and Warrnambool to the growing centres of Ballarat, Bendigo, and Castlemaine and out to the rudimentary settlements of the day, such as Ararat and Maldon. The system worked; a correspondent from Bendigo (February 1854) wrote that 'Tarrengower is well supplied with all kind of provision and merchandise. Prices are very reasonable for everything except water.' (1)

When Maldon's rush started in December 1853, a District Gold Commissioners camp was set up at the Tarrangower diggings in January 1854 (2), and on 4 February 1854 the town site of Maldon was gazetted (3). Typical of their goldfields' pattern, Maldon's first traders found an unoccupied site beside the track and set up shop by erecting a demountable shed or merely hanging a sheep carcass from a tree. Most traders moved on with the diggers, packing up their stuff and following the crowd. But some decided to take a punt on Maldon, and built timber and iron buildings (later brick) (2). In a very real sense, Maldon's Central Heritage Precinct owes its existence to their persistence.

Searching for a better life

To illustrate Maldon's development, we can follow the fictional adventures of a young British couple, he a miner, she a shop assistant, who landed in Geelong in autumn 1854. They were assisted migrants, given free passage to escape their coal town drudgery for the goldfields' potential of a better livelihood (5). They found lodgings and storage for the household goods they brought, and she soon found work in a Moorabool Street drapery store, freeing their meagre financial stake for his prospecting. They purchased tools, a tent and swag; she added cooking utensils, lamp, and provisions, and they booked his passage to Ballarat and their fortune. But after three years, the Ballarat field was too well developed for individual enterprise, and furthermore, in foment over miners' licences and favouritism (6). He had experienced enough such conflict as a miner and avoided the issue by travelling to the Tarrangower diggings by way of Castlemaine - just in time to see the place deserted from news of the Simsons' Ranges (Maryborough) rush (7). But the location was attractive with water and shelter at the Butts (Mt Tarrengower Rd), and prospects here were as good as anywhere else. Especially when he found 'rock' within a few hours of prospecting (turned out to be pyrites).

As a miner, he was undeterred by 'false gold' and soon partnered up with a quiet bloke working the reefs at today's Nuggettys. Partnering was a common practice to maximise plot allocation/s, but relationships were often fraught when costs exceeded gold produced (8). Within a year, he had a good stake, and by 1855, fossicking was giving way to mechanised quartz reef mining. Maldon was becoming established, expanding south along Parkin's Reef, north at Eagle Hawk (a suburb) and east to Porcupine (the route north from Castlemaine to rushes at Moliagul, Kingower). The couple decided that they could settle in Maldon and raise their family, with his mining experience of value in the industry and her aim to open a shop.

The trials of the British governing their new Victorian colony.

After gold discoveries were officially declared in 1851, the rapid expansion of the supposedly agriculture-based colony and the volatility of the rushes stretched the Victorian government to breaking point. By December 1852, the colony's population had already doubled to 151,127 (including 50,514 non-indigenous women and 2,500 Aborigines). Annual arrivals from across the world increased by about 25 per cent (with some 20,000 women) up to the 1857 census, which recorded a total Victorian population of 410,766 (m 264,334, f 146,432) (9).

(Lieutenant) Governor Charles LaTrobe (duties Oct. 1839 – May 1854) oversaw the Victorian colony's foundation, followed by the short administration of Charles Hotham (Jun. 1854 Dec.1855) (10). LaTrobe's infrastructure expenditures resulted in high debt, which he tried to mitigate with a general miner's licence (30 shillings [£1.10s] per month Aug. 1851; raised to 60s. [£3] pm Dec 1851) for a small claim of 2.4m2 (8ft2) (11). This led to the peaceful protest of the Chewton Monster Meeting (December 1851) and later the Bendigo Red Ribbon Rebellion (August 1853). LaTrobe responded with the 1853 Goldfields act (IV Dec 1853, s. III), reducing the licence to £8pa (or £1 for 1 month, £2 – 2 months, £4 – 6 months) (12). Finally, the Eureka Stockade uprising (December 1854) resulted in Governor Hotham in April 1855 moving 50 per cent of Victoria's revenue from licences to a gold export tax of 2s.6d. per oz (13) when the London gold price was £4.4s. (14). Then came the June 1855 Gold Fields Amendment Act that reversed the colonial administration's attitude to diggers having the *right to mine* rather than *licensed to mine*, the latter being allowed to mine (15). The price of the miners' victory was £10pa (three months. £2.10s; six months. £5). This fee was extended to all persons carrying out business on the goldfields (June 1855 s.IV) (16). The cost to the Government was such that its expenditure was halved between 1854 and 1855 (17).

Of importance to 1854 Maldon, the December 1853 *Act IV* with the miner's licence at £8 pa had also raised the goldfields storekeeper's licence (s.IV) to £50 pa (or £15 for three months, £25 for six months) (12). Other early Maldon licence fees were also hefty: £100 each pa for auctioneers (Act XXVII Jan 1853) and publicans (Act XXIV Apr 1854) (18). But the June 1855 *Gold Fields Amendment Act* (15) gave the miners everything they wanted - at a price – and extended that licence rate to all businesses on the goldfields – except publicans and auctioneers. Squatters' fees were arguably £10 per 20 miles square until the Land Act 1861, which broke their hold (19).

Even with the fee roller coaster, the Maldon (Victorian) weekly household bill fell from £7 in 1854 to £2.7s in 1861 as imported goods poured into the country and prices crashed (20). But also in 1861, the price of gold began its steep decline from (London prices) £4.4s per oz in 1860 to £2 in 1864, working its way back up to £4.4s. in 1879 (14). This had a profound effect on Maldon as gold mining companies foundered without sufficient gold returns for mining equipment to work the tough quartz reefs.

Navigating bureaucracy for land titles and other sorties

Events moved fast after Maldon achieved town site status. With commendable alacrity, John Templeton (May 1854) surveyed an area to the north of Franklin/Francis Sts, with a view of moving the traders to a location further north, perhaps to avoid sorting out the traders' shambolic premises along the creek (Main St) (2). It was not to be; they stayed put on Main Street and its direct access to transport and creek water. Templeton tried the same ruse at Clunes in 1858, this time to avoid regular flooding of lower Fraser Street with similar (lack of) success. Then Thomas Adair (March 1856) surveyed Maldon's central precinct by recognising the inevitable configuration, and Hugh Swain (December 1856) completed the surveying job to the south (2). These surveys produced general law land titles, which rely on holders passing their asset on a single written deed, perfect for miner's right occupation, not so much for the centralised records of the Torrens system, perfect for a database,

Using their miner's right of April 1855, the couple purchased the freehold title to their leased land in High Street near the Kangaroo Hotel in 1856. They (re)built her shop and a residence behind, and (he) got to vote in the new Legislative Assembly and existing Legislative Council elections that year.

Armed with her £10 pa shopkeeper's licence, licence, the would-be retailer had shop experience but little local knowledge. For commercial intelligence, she turned to the Castlemaine branch of the Bank of Australasia (headquarters London), which was happy to help female entrepreneurs. Nevertheless, the Bank of New South Wales opened in 1858, procuring gold and offering commercial services

Living the lifestyle, then

The couple found themselves in a thriving commercial precinct belying the three years of its existence. High Street now extended to Telegraph Road (telegraph station 1859, post office 1870) (2) and the Springs, whilst Main Street serviced Eaglehawk and Porcupine (Bendigo Road). Maldon became a real town (municipality) in August 1858 (21). By 1861, Maldon had stabilised at 3,300 residents, which made it the 8th largest town in Victoria (22).

The couple juggled finances between their general store and his various mining positions over the lean years, and then a serendipitous purchase of shares in an Eaglehawk mine gave them considerable financial respite, including a trip back to see family in Wales. With their own growing family, it was time to sell the High Street premises and move to a new (Victorian) house on Templeton Street. A new store was built on an abandoned site purchased at auction in Main Street where her 1860s design flair could be indulged.

The gilded Maldon economy produced an exuberant array of commercial facades as shopkeepers jostled to be (similarly) different. The constant was a verandah over the footpath to protect passers-by from the heat or rain and to display the shop's daily offerings. Maldon Central boasted building façade styles identified variously as Italianate, Gothic Revival, Georgian, Classical Revival, plus later Arts and Crafts and Edwardian styles (23). For the verandahs, the Arup report (24) identified roofs as straight (pre-1900) and without guttering along the front, with simple detailing to the posts. Persistence and evolution by the dedicated Maldon business people gave us an irreplaceable heritage, which the current occupiers are (thankfully) maintaining.

.. and now

Aesthetically, the Maldon Central Heritage Precinct is significant, intact, with sufficient differences 'in scale and form (single and double-storey wall heights, hipped and gabled roofs), materials (weatherboard, face brick, stone, corrugated iron and plaster or cement render) and detailing (eclecticism across ornamented parapets and verandah details) [combining] to present a distinctly layered and picturesque streetscape character' (2).



The 350 metres of Maldon's largely 19th-century Central Heritage Precinct is the key criterion of heritage value. A century and a half after gold was found, these jostling shopfronts and their later grander brick compatriots form an authentic, intact, and continuous Australian 'historic gem' (25). Today's travellers pass High Street's Caledonian quartz kiln relics straight into an authentic 'Australiana' setting of shopfronts with their promenades of verandahs. Time has only improved the authenticity of the precinct without damage to its intrinsic character. Our couple's story adds to the social fabric of Maldon and forms part 4 of why Maldon is important to Australia.

New bike book - 16 Maldon-to-Maldon bike rides

MALDON Cycling Group has just published a book with information about 16 local bike rides. They all start and finish in Maldon and are of varying distances and difficulty - from a short one around town to much longer rides. Peter Strang, one of the team who produced the book said, "There are some great rides around Maldon. Hopefully, this book will help some locals and visitors explore the area by bike".


The book contains nine A4 maps showing 16 road rides. Each with detailed route descriptions, elevation profiles and local photographs. The rides cover a wide area. These include Bridgewater in the north, down to Daylesford, out to Maryborough, and across to Leanganook (Mount Alexander).


The rides are on surfaced roads, suitable for most types of bikes. All start and finish at Maldon, but you can join at other points on the route if you like. Many of the rides are via Castlemaine. Routes are on quiet roads where possible, but some sections with heavier traffic can't be avoided entirely.

"There are many different types of bike riders. This book includes some challenging road rides. We plan to produce a book of gravel rides and one for more casual riders," said Peter.

The book is sold at Maldon Newsagency, Mt Tarrengower General Store (formerly The Book Wolf), Maldon Bicycles, Maldon Getaways new hub store, and the Maldon & Castlemaine Visitor Information Centres. It is also at Stoneman's Bookroom in Castlemaine and Giant Bike Shop (Hargraves Street, Castlemaine). It is also available in Maryborough and Bendigo. RRP is \$15, but the price may vary at some outlets.

Maldon Cycling is a local group of bike riders who run the Maldon Classic, a display of classic steel bikes (to be held again in early 2024). They also have a team in the Murray to Moyne cycle relay and raise funds for Maldon Hospital. The maps (and some gravel ride maps) are on the Maldon Cycling website – www.maldoncycling.org.





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THE FRONTIER CHILD

The frontier child must make choices in the evening as the gramophone plays Viennese waltzes and the cows come wandering home.

The music is so pretty and the bovine beasts so warm.
They smell of the earth and rich dung.
She is caught there on strings of delight as the night grows out of the sweet-smelling lucerne hay and sounds of the chiffon dance.

'This land is ours,' her father says from the verandah slats, hitching up his denim work pants, gesturing across the creek to the slate hillside and the river red gums with their arms frozen, as if wanting to begin a story and waiting on their cue.

But he has the stage and her love for him flows up with the cooling night breeze to the yellow lights that her mother has just flicked on as she lays out the lace tablecloth.

The little generator thumps in its tin shed. Its beat contradicts the waltz and it smells of diesel and oil, not milk and lucerne hay. But it brings them light and music, both of which she feels so keenly.

There's a bat flitting into the dark and an owl with its rhetorical questions—like her dad—asking, "Who will inherit this earth?"
"Who could have done this but us?"
"Who is Lord of their own creation?"

But she has crossed over the creek and seen the scarred tree, where the others sliced off the bark to make their vessels. She has retrieved from the ploughed ground

a smooth green, serpentine axe-head, polished to a fine glaze,

and held it and felt the other hands that held it.

In the morning the school bus (which is really a faded red truck with a dusty canvas canopy)

will stop at the camp on the edge of the forest and they will leap aboard,

full of a vibrant energy she both fears and envies. She wants to be friends but has seen that look in her mother's eyes and knows there is one boundary she must not cross.

And she wonders what her mother fears and why her father struts on the verandah as if to deny the black night that comes like a cashmere shawl, like all her dreams of a satin life.

Like he, too, is afraid of what might come wandering home.

Q. My dog is terrified of having his nails trimmed! How important is it to trim his nails, and do you have any tips on how to do this without stressing him out too much?


Keeping your dog's nails at the right length is important for ensuring your dog's toes and footpads contact the ground normally, allowing them to walk and run comfortably. If their nails are too long, they can struggle to grip the floor properly, which can make walking on wooden or slippery floors a bit tricky – especially for older dogs or dogs with arthritis. Long nails are also more prone to breaking or splitting and may even grow into the footpads, causing pain and possibly infection.

Most dogs will wear their claws down naturally if they regularly walk on bitumen or pavement. Dogs that don't have access to these surfaces, or aren't able to walk enough to wear their nails down, may need to have their nails trimmed from time to time. Dogs also have dewclaws on their front and sometimes hind legs. Since these are located higher up on the limb and don't make contact with the ground, they will often need to be trimmed.

You might have a sense that your dog's nails are too long if you start to notice them walking on their toes, limping, or slipping on smooth floors. You may also hear them clicking on the floor when they walk. To check whether your dog's nails are too long, gently lift up their paw and see whether the nail extends beyond the footpad. You can also check when your dog is standing with their foot on the ground. If the nail extends beyond the footpad or makes contact with the ground, then it may need to be trimmed. Another way to check is to have a look at the quick, which is the bundle of blood vessels and nerves that supply the nail. The pink quick is easily visible in white claws, but can be difficult or even impossible to see in black or dark-coloured claws. It's important not to cut the quick as this will result in pain and bleeding and is a common reason why dogs can become terrified at having their nails cut.

Some dogs can have severe anxiety about having their nails trimmed. In these situations, it's actually safer to have their nails trimmed at a vet clinic where they can be sedated for the procedure. You can also have their nails professionally trimmed by a groomer. However, with the right technique and approach, regular nail trimming can be achieved just as easily by their owners. Next week, we'll discuss some methods you can use to safely and easily trim your dog's nails at home.

THIS WEEK'S QUESTION:

We're doing OK now – what would be so bad about voting No to the Voice?

To answer this, we are going to quote from a recent article by Allan Patience, an honorary fellow in political science in the University of Melbourne.

'The referendum is about nothing less than the civil rights of Indigenous Australians who have been denied those rights for more than 200 years of white settler colonialism. Seriously addressing Indigenous people's civil rights is the most significant issue ever to come before the Australian people ... a fair go for the very people who have been denied it for so long.

The outcome of the referendum will demonstrate whether or not we, as a nation, have a moral compass. If it fails, the consequence will be a bitterly divided country, destroying any chance for a consensus on how the nation can move forward. We'll end up as a country divided, angry, and full of hubris and self-importance – a country which our talented, intelligent and creative young people will not want to be part of.

Failure will also mean that the world will judge us harshly. Some crucial trading partners could well impose sanctions on us, just like the sanctions that crippled the economy of white South Africa during the apartheid era. This would be disastrous for the country's wheat, barley, wine, seafood, and iron ore exporters for example. And any pretence that we are a nation that respects and upholds human rights will be scoffed at, especially by those countries we've had the temerity to criticise for their poor human rights records."

Maldon for Yes



AMY HALFPENNY'S CLAIM

On Tuesday 20 November 1900, Bert Halfpenny was killed in a mining accident at the Eaglehawk Consolidated mine near where the State Battery now stands. He had been working at the 1,068 feet level and, with his mate Thomas Shearer, had set four charges and lit the fuses. They gave the signal to be drawn up in a bucket, but after they had travelled about 50 feet, the bucket hit a timber support and Halfpenny was thrown out and fell to the bottom of the shaft. He was killed when the charges exploded.

At the inquest into Halfpenny's death, Shearer said the only light they had came from four candles that went out soon after the bucket was drawn up. He also admitted that neither he nor Halfpenny had used the straps provided when ascending in the bucket. After hearing further evidence from the company, the inquest's jury found that Halfpenny's death had been accidental. It also found that the management of Eaglehawk Consolidated was not at fault as they had taken every care and precaution. The jury also recommended that permanent lights should be installed at the bottom of all shafts.

Bert Halfpenny was 28 years old when he died. He was born in Maldon and had been a prominent local sportsman, captaining Maldon to their first football premiership in 1894. He married Amy Gabbedy, who was also born in Maldon, in 1896 and they had two children, Albert Jnr and Helena.

In August 1901 Amy Halfpenny brought a compensation claim against Eaglehawk Consolidated seeking £3,000 for the loss of her family's breadwinner. The company denied liability on the basis that Halfpenny's negligence had contributed to his own death. The evidence presented was similar to that given at the inquest and the Court found in favour of the company dismissing Amy's claim with costs.

Amy Halfpenny, who had declined a last minute offer of £200 to settle the case, shouted 'kill me, kill me' when the verdict was announced. Her later appeals were dismissed. The only compensation Amy eventually received was £50 and the costs of Bert's funeral paid by his union, the Amalgamated Miners' Association.

Or perhaps you're wondering about that old bottle you found in an overgrown corner of your garden? Look no further than The Victorian Thirst by local author Ken Arnold. Other books by local authors include A Survey Of Australiana 1790–1940 by Bendigo antiques dealers Kevin Carney, Willi Carney and Paul McKenna. Kevin Carney also co-authored The Catalogue And History Of Cottage Chairs In Australia with another local author, Peter Cuffley. You'll find all these books, and more, in their new home in the Hall.

Talking of new homes, the Maldon Collection has begun what we hope will be its final move to the other side of the Main Room where it can be better housed on shelves that accommodate its many tall books. But we are beginning to think 'Maldon Collection' is a misnomer. Yes, there are many books about our town and its people - books such as Maldon: Australia's First Notable Town by Grant Blackman and John Larkin; Maldon: A New History 1853 -1928 by Brian Rhule; and Maldon And The Tarrangower Diggings by local man A.J. Williams. Or should the name acknowledge the Dja Dja Wurrung, the traditional owners of the land through which the Coliban flows, where the diggings took place and where these towns now stand?





Book Reviews

Wifedom by Anna Funder, 2023

This is the story of the marriage behind some of the most famous literary works of the 20th century and a probing consideration of what it means to be a wife and a writer in the modern world.

Eileen O'Shaughnessy married Orwell in 1936. O'Shaughnessy was a writer herself, and her literary brilliance not only shaped Orwell's work, but her practical common sense saved his life. But why and how, Funder wondered, was she written out of their story? Using newly discovered letters from Eileen to her best friend, Funder re-creates the Orwells' marriage through the Spanish Civil War and the Second World War in London. As she peeks behind the curtain of Orwell's private life, she is led to question what it takes to be a writer—and what it is to be a wife.

The Visitors by Jane Harrison, 2023

On a sweltering day, 26 January 1788, on a bluff high above Sydney Cove, seven Aboriginal men stand looking out to sea. Moored off-shore is a huge nowee (boat), then there are two, then more. Who are these visitors? Where are they from? What do they want? Should they be turned away by force or welcomed to country?

In The Visitors, Muruwari playwright Jane Harrison (*Stolen, Rainbow's End*) reimagines the arrival of the First Fleet from a First Nations' perspective. These senior men, carrying the weight of cultural responsibility, must decide what action they'll take toward these unwanted arrivals. A decision, under pressure, that will have unforeseeable repercussions and forever. Told with wit, charm, and a fierce intelligence, Harrison's story upends the dominant point of view of this pivotal event. Annotated and with an introduction by Wesley Enoch.

Homecoming by Kate Morton, 2023

Adelaide Hills, Christmas Eve, 1959: At the end of a scorching hot day, beside a creek on the grounds of a grand and mysterious mansion, a local delivery man makes a terrible discovery. A police investigation is called and the small town of Tambilla becomes embroiled in one of the most shocking and perplexing murder cases in the history of South Australia.

Mount Alexander Shire Bolsters Flood Recovery Efforts

MOUNT Alexander Shire Council has taken a decisive step forward in bolstering flood recovery and future preparedness by appointing two new Community Recovery and Resilience Officers. The staff members, Neale Chandler and Natalie Pitts, have been entrusted with aiding flood-hit communities of Campbells Creek, Castlemaine, Newstead, and Baringhup in their recovery journey following the devastating floods in October 2022.

Both Chandler and Pitts are set to collaborate closely with local residents and community groups. Their focus will be on executing practical measures identified by the communities themselves. These initiatives will not only foster recovery from past floods but also equip communities with better preparedness and resilience for potential future calamities.

Neale Chandler stated, "Our first priority has been to meet with people and groups who've been impacted by the flood to hear their ideas about opportunities that could help to lead to lasting change in their communities." Such proactive engagements have already been fruitful. Chandler noted the development of a flood emergency response plan for one locality and pinpointed another community's



requirement for continuous outreach support.

The duo's work complements other ongoing projects aimed at flood recovery and preparedness, such as the creation of flood resilience-resources in collaboration with the community and various emergency agencies. This includes comprehensive evacuation plans, especially for the vulnerable, and indepth flood information guides. Efforts are also underway to fortify ties between local communities and agencies involved in flood resilience, preparedness, and recovery.

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

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
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

State Forests Open for Firewood Collection

VICTORIANS are now able to collect the significance of planning, as firewood free firewood from state forests. The spring collection season began on Friday, 1 September, and it allows for personal collection in designated areas.

Amy Groch, the Regional Manager Forest and Fire Planning, reminded the public to collect only from the designated firewood collection areas. She highlighted the importance of safety, stating that some areas might remain inaccessible immediately after winter due to wet conditions. Groch warned collectors of possible falling trees or limbs, urging them to remain cautious.

There are collection limits in place: a maximum of two cubic metres per individual each day and up to 16 cubic metres annually per household. Groch emphasised from spring and autumn collections requires 8-12 months to dry sufficiently for use. To further support local communities, Central Victoria will restrict firewood collection to residents of specific councils.

While most follow these guidelines, officials will monitor the areas, ensuring regulations are upheld. Those found breaching these rules may face fines up to \$769. The public is encouraged to report any suspicious activities on 136 186.

The collection season will conclude on 30 November, Information on collection areas and assistance for low-income residents purchasing firewood can be found on the official website.


